#### Míníster's Letter

#### Give me a light...

Dear Friends,

As I write another New Year is fast approaching, a time to say farewell to one year with its joys and sorrows and to greet a new year with fresh hopes and latent concerns.

It is a time marked in our nation by the striking of the now restored, 'Big Ben' and reflective features in papers looking back over the last year.



As with many previous years, this last year has not been without challenge, not least the awfulness of the Russian invasion of peaceable Ukraine, fuelling an energy and cost of living crisis impacting across the world. This in the wake of the still unresolved wranglings of Brexit and the ongoing legacy of Covid has resulted in one of the so-called words of the year being, 'permacrisis'. A word defined by the Collins Dictionary as "an extended period of instability and insecurity". And I haven't even mentioned climate change. Oh dear.

Amidst our anxiety and uncertainty, we can be sure that the clock won't stop ticking. But I believe that though change, whether welcome or not will come, God will continue to be real and present. I look back and sense God's hand in life, and read through the Bible of God's guidance through countless generations, and gain confidence that whatever the future holds, God will still be present, chiding, supporting, guiding, comforting, challenging and loving, because that is what the stories of faith tell us.

As we move from Christmas into a New Year may we have the sense that God in Christ who we greeted in the manger, will remain with us in the year to come. The African-American theologian, Howard Thurman, wrote a piece entitled 'The Work of Christmas':

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks,

the work of Christmas begins: to find the lost, to heal the broken, to feed the hungry, to release the prisoner, to rebuild the nations, to bring peace among the people, to make music in the heart.

As people of faith hope, we have a calling to play our part in bringing peace among people and making music in heart, acts which can dissipate feelings of helplessness and hopelessness as we shape through our worship, fellowship and outreach a less-crisis themed future.

With these thoughts in mind, I've offered a pair of texts to accompany us through 2023 at Emmanuel, see below and page 7.

As you set off in the New Year, I offer a quote that I've shared before from the poem 'Gate of the Year' by the philosopher Minnie Louise Haskins. It was used in the King's 1939 Christmas Day address, part of which reads:

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'
And he replied, 'Go into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way!'

As 2023 dawns, may you be conscious of the light of Christ illuminating your journey, and may you reflect that light along your way.

#### From the Treasurer

Dear Members and Friends,

January marks the beginning of a new year for our Freewill Offering scheme, when numbered books of envelopes for each Sunday of the year are handed out to those who still use them.

For other Members and Friends who have arranged a standing order or a regular bank transfer, a numbered book of envelopes is no longer supplied, but each person who gives regularly has an **FWO Number**, which is especially important where a **Gift Aid Declaration** has been signed.

The FWO Number, and the Gift Aid Declaration, enable the church to reclaim an additional 25 % on the amount given by those who are tax payers, and this can apply to any other giving to charity through our church – Christian Aid, Commitment for Life are examples of this.

May I thank everybody who continues to give faithfully to Emmanuel Church through the Freewill Offering scheme. Some we see every week, some can't get to church very often, and some have moved away, but all continue to support the work and witness of our church with their giving.

In our last financial year our Freewill Offerings came to £45000, and I am hoping that we can achieve at least the same amount in the year ahead, and possibly improve on last year's total.

Whatever the outcome in the year ahead, thank you for your continuing financial support.

### Ramblings: Nature Notes from God's Creation - reflecting on a year

(a monthly reflection, interweaving nature and faith, from our minister, David)

As the year draws to a close it feels an opportune moment to review the last year, including my experiences of nature. The UN has been doing this recently through the COP 15 Biodiversity Conference, a parallel process to the COP Climate Changes conferences, on conservation of the richness of the earth's species. The outcome is, in a sentence, 'need to try much harder and more urgently, with a target set of protecting 30% of the world's lands, seas, coasts and inland waters by 2030. Time will tell how the UK and other nations actually respond.

One of the motivations to conserve species is for the well-being of humanity, but from a faith perspective there is recognition of the calling to nurture and care for what is the God-given gift of creation, which has integrity beyond being valued by people.

For me, rambling in nature can have a spiritual quality. So some nature highlights from my 2022, include:

#### On Mull:

- watching with Jan a pair of otters fishing and playing, ducking and diving,
- almost daily sightings of the utterly majestic Sea Eagle flying

#### In the home counties

- Visiting Blean Woods in East Kent, site of a rewilding project, and seeing the rare Heath Fritillary Butterfly (pictured right), oh, and then a White Admiral, both firsts for us. A wonderful day.
- Wandering on a manicured lawn at Cambridge Botanic Garden and being surprised by my first ever White-letter Hairsteak Butterfly alighting on the grass (pictured on the right). They are normally seen fluttering around the treetops. It is named from the thin white coloured W shape on its wing.





#### Nearer to home:

The joy of seeing one of my favourite butterflies, the
Orange Tip at Hutchinson Bank, Featherbed Lane near New Addington.
For me this Spring butterfly heralds the joy, verdancy, fecundity and
promise of the season.

• The electric-blue dash of the Kingfisher along the Ravensbourne running through Ladywell Fields,

And at home:

Badgers bustling through our garden in a Spring evening gloaming.

Some species I sought out, others I tripped over or simply spotted when I wasn't deliberately looking, and each remain firm in memory. One of the natural and indeed spiritual joys of the world, without which life would be immeasurably poorer. I wonder if any nature sights have lingered long in your mind or have enriched your soul this year. John Muir, Scottish born father of the US environmental movement, wrote:

Earth has no sorrow that earth cannot heal.

Of all the paths you take in life, make sure a few of them are dirt.

Nature's peace will flow into you as sunshine into trees.

In our 'permacrisis' dogged world, we need nature more than ever.

As 2023 opens, may you, too, have some encounters in the natural world to gladden your heart and enrich your soul with the wonder of God's gifts.

p.s. The Reformed Martin Luther wrote: "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree." Inspired, I collected an acorn shed by the ancient Wickham Oak, and have planted it in a pot. Should it germinate I plan to plant it at the end of the manse garden, hoping that my little act may bequeath a nature-rich future.

p.p.s. Having written a series on pilgrimage to Sacred Sites on Scottish Isles (2021) and on Nature Ramblings (2022), for 2023 I plan to continue such occasional writings, but switch medium to Facebook. I hope that through posting an occasional picture and reflection, I can share a spiritual message more widely.

Following our harvest giving to Commitment for Life here is an update about some of the work in Zimbabwe.

#### **BRACT** in Zimbabwe

Christian Aid has had a long and fruitful presence in Zimbabwe, in affiliation with various partners who deliver transformative programmes on the ground.

One such programme is BRACT. This initiative over five years has formed part of the Zimbabwe Resilience Building Fund (ZBRF). It was developed with the aim of helping communities prepare and adapt to a changing climate and economic shocks and stand up for the rights of ordinary people.

The programme's full title is: Building Resilience through improving the Absorptive and Adaptive Capacity for Transformation (BRACT) of at-risk communities in the Mutoko and Mudzi districts of Zimbabwe.

Through BRACT, Commitment for Life supports vulnerable households that are affected by recurring shocks, mostly related to climate change. BRACT has enabled us to build partnership in Zimbabwe, and we are grateful to those who administer the work on the ground.

As we begin the new year, Commitment for Life wants to thank each of you for the precious gift of your support. This enables us to deliver support programmes like BRACT that make an enormous difference in the lives of the people of Zimbabwe.

We have met some lovely people. What started out as a help to the community has turned out to be a blessing to Emmanuel.

Newspapers, Emmanuel Life, some Christmas literature and our What's On leaflets, books for borrowing and single gospels are provided. There are also some games, puzzle and colouring books, and free Wi-fi.

The people who have been serving coffee continue to do so and some also help at other times, together with further volunteers from Emmanuel, the WI and Memory Box. Two lovely ladies, Munni and Gita, who wanted to do something in the community, have served lunch each week together with Jan Pickering.

Most weeks David has made a different flavour soup, Janet Pickering, Munni and Gita have also made soup, and a pre-Christmas treat of curry and rice. As well as biscuits we serve cake in the afternoon and enjoyed mince pies at Christmas.

We soon realised that many who enjoy this time of welcome and fellowship want to give a financial contribution so there is a plate for donations to The Vine Foodbank and so far we have raised a few hundred pounds.
