Míníster's Letter

Meeting Matthew

Dear Friends,

The recently celebrated Chinese New Year marked the beginning of the year of the rabbit. Many churches have an annual focus too, typically in a three-year cycle focusing in Year A on Matthew, Year B on Mark and Year C on Luke, with each year exploring John's Gospel along the way.

We are currently setting out in Year A which began in Advent 2022 and will run through to the end of November 2023, during which many preachers will focus on Matthew's Gospel.

As Matthew's year gets underway, I'm excited to say that, with no expense 'Spare'd, our Joint Pastorate, Emmanuel URC and Elmers End Free Church, has landed a major scoop - an interview with Matthew! This is being published in the February edition of their respective magazines, Emmanuel Life and News & Views. Eat your heart out Penguin Random House! Hopefully our editors expectations of the February edition of Emmanuel Life being a major seller are managed!

And as if that isn't enough, despite a multi-million bid from Netflix, our pastorate has secured exclusive rights to screen 'Matthew, Mission and Me', a major new six part series running through March into early April (in church speak – the season of Lent!). This follows the previous Psalms at Seven (2021) and Looking at Luke (2022), with 'Matthew, Mission and Me', being available on a Zoom call near you, see accompanying advert. In other words – this is our 2023 Lent Course.

For now, I hand over to our roving reporter, as he interviews Matthew.

Meanwhile, may the February days be sunny, the snow and frost be at bay, and God's love warm the cockles of your heart.

David Matthew, what were your hopes in writing your gospel?

Matthew I wanted to tell the story of Jesus and share with the readers some of

what he means to me and the church that I belong to.

David What inspired you to write your gospel?

Matthew

There were several influences. First, I like others, was aware that the number of people who knew Jesus and heard and saw what he did and said at first hand were dying out. As their generation passed away it became important to record the stories to hand down to the following generations. I wasn't the only one. Mark had already written his account and I heard that Luke was busy as well. But I was

particularly motivated to write a 'gospel' that spoke to the experiences

and lives of those in my church.

David Tell me a bit more about you and your church?

Matthew
You know my name is Matthew. Some have conjectured that I am the Matthew who was a disciple of Jesus, others that I am Matthew, formerly Levi the tax collector, for whom meeting Jesus was a truly life -changing experience. Others, mindful that my gospel was completed around 80-90 AD have done the sums and concluded that it was more likely that I lived during the first generation after Jesus, but heard the stories at first hand from those who knew him.

As for my church, most theologians suspect it was located in Antioch, in Syria. The clues in the gospel suggest that it was a church of Jewish Christians that had struggled in the fledgling faith, not least after the huge trauma that followed in the wake of the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in AD70. As you read my gospel, you may find more than a hint of a struggle between the new and liberating teaching of Jesus and the dogged, legalistic and dry interpretation of the faith by some Pharisees and Sadducees.

David So where did you get your material?

Matthew It came from a few sources, from eye witnesses in our church who spoke of Jesus. Some actually think that Jesus' disciple Matthew or Levi/Matthew may have founded or belonged to my church. There were also stories circulating by word of mouth and some in written documentation. You'll notice similarities between the gospels

named after Mark, Luke and myself suggesting that we had some common source material, which we each arranged and focused to speak to the experiences of those we knew.

David

How would you feel if I suggested that people would be reading your gospel two thousand years after it was first read?

Matthew

The human bit of me would be stunned that it had survived so long, and proud that something I'd edited, written and shaped had proved worth keeping. But as I reflect, two further thoughts strike. First, if the authorities couldn't keep Jesus sealed in a tomb, then they couldn't keep his stories from circulating.

Second, although the gospel has my name on it, the words, the stories and even the arrangement are God-inspired and speak of deep truth. My gospel ends with a command and promise of Jesus:

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

So to answer your question, I am delighted people are still reading my gospel, that it still speaks truth to life, but perhaps not surprised, because the gospel isn't just a collection of words but God-inspired teaching from Jesus that I am sure will remain until the end of the age.

David

Thank you. And where can we find out more about you, your Gospel and what it means for our church mission and personal discipleship?

Matthew

That's the easiest one, look out for the launch of Matthew, Mission and Me, available on a Zoom Lent-style meeting exclusively through a church near to your heart from 1st March.

Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Ramblings: Nature Notes from God's Creation

(a monthly reflection, interweaving nature and faith, from our minister, David)

As 2022 bowed out I wrote what I thought was my final copy of Nature Ramblings, reflecting on aspects of the wonders of God's creation through 2022. I also indicated that with the launch of our Facebook, I'd transfer my attentions (and alliterations?) there. But I was lobbied... and requested to both continue with Facebook and Nature Ramblings in Emmanuel Life. And so back by demand, for an edition or two...

As I write in mid-January, the grass and air are crisp white, held in a second wintry blast, and yet, signs of new life may be seen and heard.

Outside in the evening air I can hear an occasional bark together with an unsettling and somewhat bloodcurdling scream. Last year's fox cubs have not long left their parental care, so the typically faithful dog and vixen mate again. The night's eerie cries and screams are part of their seasonal mating. With a gestation period of around 52 days, the new season's cubs may be born around the end of February. We'll be looking out for a first glimpse of the new litter in our garden.

Meanwhile, another harbinger of Spring may be seen. Shortly after Christmas we spotted the first shoots of bulbs, and now our garden has nodding patches turning a whiter shade of green, as the familiar slender stems with white heads emerge.

The nature poet Wordsworth published his poem, To a snowdrop, in 1819, opening: LONE Flower, hemmed in with snows and white as they

But hardier far, once more I see thee bend Thy forehead, as if fearful to offend, Like an unbidden guest. Though day by day, Storms, sallying from the mountain-tops, waylay The rising sun, and on the plains descend; Yet art thou welcome, welcome as a friend.



Wordsworth greets the flower as a welcome and unbidden friend, whose transitory appearance in somewhat unfriendly weather, marks the changing

season, and whose struggles are seen as sallying through the inclemency of life. Wordsworth concludes:

Chaste Snowdrop, venturous harbinger of Spring,

And pensive monitor of fleeting years!

Between the floral lines, Wordsworth reflects that we, too, may know times of hope and joy, life's adversity, the rising sun's rays through the passing of those fleeting years.

The opening of Psalm 23 speaks of the abiding presence of God, including through our green pasture, and might we add, flowery meadow moments, restoring soul:

The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing.

He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul.

So I'm thankful for the snowdrop, a first bloom in the year's meadow, to lift our souls.

Overseas charity of the year

Soarta is the overseas charity that we have chosen to support through our giving on Christmas Day and at our Summer Fair later this year.



The Soarta Community Association is based in Moldova and a team of volunteers have supported many thousands of Ukrainian refugees arriving in Moldova.

The Association welcomes refugees on the border with Ukraine to offer packages of food, warm meals, toiletries, school supplies, toys, and nappies. They also provide mobile sim cards preloaded with 15 minutes of call time and 20GB of internet to save data roaming charges.

Soarta is known to Commitment for Life through its global partner work and the URC has made a donation to aid this work.

Francis Brienen, URC Deputy General Secretary (Mission), said: "The Mission Team fully endorses Churches Together in England's call for the immediate end to the conflict in Ukraine. We commend the work being undertaken to help refugees by so many wonderful people in neighbouring countries.

"We are especially grateful for Asea Railean in Moldova, director of the NGO Soarta, for her tireless work in supporting Ukrainian women and children."

What makes the effort by these people so remarkable is that Moldova is the poorest country in Europe but is giving so much to welcome refugees into their country. I hope that we can give generously to Soarta. We can do this at our Summer Fair or by adding to the amount raised on Christmas Day.

'St Christopher's: More than just a hospice' Emmanuel's Local Charity for Christmas 2022

It is our tradition at Emmanuel to support two charities with our Christmas Day collection, one overseas and one local: St Christopher's was the local charity that benefitted from half the money last Christmas. Do you wonder how that money will be used? Perhaps you have preconceived ideas about the hospice, so maybe the reality will surprise you.

St Christopher's hospice was founded by Cicely Saunders in 1967 to meet the specific needs of patients with terminal illnesses. She aimed to make the lives of such patients as comfortable and dignified as possible, and to ease their loneliness and suffering. The hospice became a centre of excellence.

Now, St Christopher's not only achieves these outcomes for patients, it also adds depth and quality to their lives. With art and music therapy sessions, money advice, companionship, complementary therapies, rehabilitation, spiritual and emotional support and much more, life can be lived to the full.

It doesn't stop there either. St Christopher's has recently built a state-of-the-art centre named CARE: The **C**entre for **A**wareness and **R**esponse to **E**nd of Life. CARE is a learning space for professionals and Carers; it offers courses and workshops, as well as art exhibitions, events and space for quiet contemplation, and the centre is open to everyone. The significance of St Christopher's reaches much further than the local community, as it is one of the largest providers of palliative care education in the world.

Eco Hints & Tips

We've been asked by a few people to start including some eco hints and tips each month in the newsletter. Some of the choices you can make in your lifestyle, trying to be better at caring for God's earth.

So between us, Sue & I will try and give you one new idea each month this year – various things we think everybody can consider. Some will be very simple (like this month), some might be a bit more complicated. Don't worry, we're not going to get into big debates on topics like electric vehicles etc, they're really hard to simplify. This will be "10 minute", easy stuff.

If you're already doing it – bravo! And give yourself a pat on the back. If it's a new idea to you – please give it a try!

February - leaky letterboxes

Did you know that around 10% of the heat loss from a normal house can escape via a badly fitting letterbox? That could be 10% of your annual gas bill you could save with one simple step.

 Easy solution – fit an internal letterbox draught excluder. The simplest model (white plastic) costs just £7 from Wickes, or a brass effect one is £7.49 from Screwfix. A model with an internal flap as well as brushes costs a bit more, up to £25, but of course it does a better job as well.




 Harder solution – fit an <u>external letterbox</u> and block up the hole in the door completely. There's a wide range of styles and sizes, many are lockable. On Amazon for example, we quickly found all sorts ranging from £30 to over £100. It's a bit more work to install of course, but well within the reach of average DIY skills.
