Míníster's Letter

something happened...

Dear Friends,

Something happened. I won't pretend that I understand what happened or can explain what happened, but something did happen.

The week before was filled with the human joy and heartache that are all too familiar in our world in our times. There was a procession, almost a state entrance, though untypically the would-be king dressed down, not up. No stretched limo equivalent but a donkey, and despite or perhaps because of that he got a right royal welcome. Cheers and waving palm branches, a national parade. Did too much expectation rest on his shoulders? Some doubted the atmosphere would last, others started plotting, so it wouldn't.

A week of twists and turns. An upset in the market sent city traders panicking, authorities took a dim view, a whispering campaign. Time for one last highlight, a celebratory meal, a remembrance of past liberation, and yet as bread was dipped so the atmosphere turned. Jesus spoke, Judas fled, hearts sank. As night passed relationships unravelled, betrayal and bruising, denials and desertions, conniving and cruelty. Then the one who entered in glory was led out to die, the sun set on another false messiah.

Then something happened, something very different from anything that had happened before.

Jesus was one in a long line of so-called messianic figures whose lives came to an abrupt end. End of life, end of story, save for a handful of disillusioned souls.

But something different happened.

Within days, news of something previously unknown, was being spread. Within weeks this Jesus was being spoken of as the Messiah, within a handful of years he was being declared to unbelievers as the Lord.

There have been many explanations down the years, the evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke and John all give a perspective that in one way or another tell of something very different happening. They relate stories of an empty tomb, of

meeting Jesus again, appearances which were both physical and almost ghostly in nature, which then stopped. But the influence remained, was reinforced and spread.

Over the years there have been many perspectives on what exactly happened. Some view the stories as pointing to a deep truth about God, others as literally describing events. Some have sought to rationalise what happened, others have dismissed the stories as fairy tale fantasy.

For me, I am content to know that something happened, a something that I can't explain, that I can't hope to ever understand, a something that may be utterly irrational to the world but which I can best describe as a deep and holy mystery.

I remember as a teenager being irritatingly told by an adult, 'I wish I was a teenager again when I knew everything'. A rueful, and doubtless deserved dig. But as the years pass, the more I learn, the more I realise there is to learn. The more insights and knowledge I gain, the more the gaps I become aware of. I don't suppose that I'm alone in such thinking.

Astronomers searching the skies are discovering more and more about the universe, yet as they peel back mysteries, they find yet more to be discovered or understood. One answer begs more questions. At the bounds of knowledge, they discover they can't always define what they observe with scientific formula or measure phenomena with empirical certainty but have to resort to using poetic and other descriptive language to convey an impression of that which has been observed or detected. Thus, phenomena which are seemingly inexplicable based on conventional physics, are instead colourfully and variously described in terms such as black holes, super nova and white dwarves. The names relating to systems of seeming order and chaos that appear related in an elegance of a design, yet beyond human comprehension. This feels almost God talk.

If such an unscientifically verifiable approach is good enough for contemporary astro-physicists gazing at the heavens, then I am content to look around the world and know that at some point nearly 2000 years ago, something happened that changed lives and communities and continues to do so today. Further that it is quite reasonable, indeed helpful, to describe the appearance of Jesus in the Easter garden and after in terms such resurrection, new life, miracle and wonder.

Like aspects of what happens in the celestial heavens, the resurrection cannot be measured or explained in Newtonian physics, nor Einsteinian and Darwinian theories, but that doesn't mean that it wasn't a real phenomenon. For something happened, which was witnessed by many that brought peace to turmoil, comfort to

grief, hope to heartache, dedication to discipleship and mission to multitudes. And in the Easter happening there is an elegance of design for creation, a true purpose for living, and a real hope beyond life. And that is God talk.

So this Easter, I hope to continue exploring its meaning, but more importantly to simply celebrate, mindful of even more that I don't know, but feeling ever more convinced and fired up that something truly life-changing happened, is still happening.

For the Lord has risen - Easter greetings

I travelled to Brighton by train with Heather Moore, a good opportunity to catch up on family, news and views. Once at the Brighthelm Centre we saw familiar faces and prepared for the day's business.

We began with worship led by adults and children from West Thamesmead Community Church, with uplifting songs, accompanied by ribbon wands, and with each reading a verse from the Psalms all about God's goodness to us. The microphone was passed to each, young and older, who led us in prayer, and we then sang I Will Sing of the Goodness of God.

During the morning we heard more about this vibrant church, how 6 years ago there was no church building, community space or congregation, just 2 ministers Revds Sally and Andrew Willett who had been placed in West Thamesmead to 'start a church'.

They were offered the use of a school hall on Sunday afternoons, prayed while walking round the area introducing themselves as the new community ministers, gave out leaflets, and invited people to chat over coffee. The school caretaker suggested they stood outside the school when it was used as a polling station and people came to them showing an interest. A Bible college student who was also a beautician offered a 'pamper session' and they held a barbecue afterwards.

So they used their resources, and the opportunities that God gave them and the church started, each year welcoming more and more.

A Nativity in the streets using people's houses with local councillors invited to be wise men (!), and a man on his balcony as Herod, games and tea with the (cardboard cut out) Queen, a multicultural Harvest and Messy Church all brought in more.

West Thamesmead's mission is 'Blessing, Belonging, Believing'.

You may remember Maurice and Juliana Omorojie who led worship at Emmanuel a while ago. They felt they belonged to West Thamesmead straight away, made new friends and were blessed with love, joy and peace. Maurice is now training for the ministry.

It was so encouraging to hear how this church has grown from just being out in the community.

We watched a video made by the Church Life Review Group (which included Revd Phil Wall, now in Milton Keynes) advocating that we look at our resources, what is working well and what is not. We were later reminded that the Southern Synod has 80 lay preachers and we should use them.

When Heather came forward to give her report on Youth Assembly she was warmly congratulated on being chosen as the Moderator Elect of Youth Assembly. She is looking forward to working with her friend Philippa Osei, the present Moderator. Heather spoke about fun, fellowship and lively worship at Youth Assembly as well as a lot of serious discussion.

Another video was about legacies of slavery, how racism can be insidious but very noticeable to the recipient, and that besides being careful of our own behaviour churches should advocate justice.

You may also remember Revd Jacob Bali who has visited Emmanuel twice. He spoke of his Special Category Ministry in London SE1 where he has a 'ministry of presence' among young people in the Waterloo area, in King's where people are about to lose loved ones and at Tower Bridge where he offers good news. At the Southwark Playhouse he was involved with actors from the local community who performed a Nativity and found church, the Bible and God 'still relevant'.

So again no church building, using the resources he has in the community. Very inspiring.

In our closing worship we were reminded how one person plants and another reaps; we are all part of God's mission.

After a walk on the beach and the pier, Heather and I returned home. I felt most positive about the day, having been among people faith-filled, all committed and hard working.

Ramblings: Nature Notes from God's Creation—A sign of Easter

One still, chill, winter's day, I wandered through Spring Park Woods. Autumn's debris lay thick on the ground, brown and browning, mulching into the lych of the woodland's humus-rich floor. The odd nut case; split, robbed, abandoned. A once sturdy trunk enveloped by fungal growth. An in-between time, a liminal moment in the cycle of life; as past seasons decayed imperceptibly into history. No apparent green shoot, no reassuring sign of hope, rather a drawn-out farewell.

Sometimes human life can feel like that. And yet, and yet, just as the darkness of



night gives way to the first shafts of dawn's probing rays, so new life will emerge from the musty floor. An age-old cycle, a natural cycle, and a cycle which humans have learnt to engage with, harness, and exploit.

Dropping down through the skeletal woods, I emerged into the Addington Bottom plain, where, a gang of volunteer hedge layers were labouring under the guiding eyes of a Commons Ranger. Hedge laying is an ancient country craft, undertaken for a variety of purposes including creating a stock-proof barrier, habitat for a diversity of species, flood control, protection of crops and simply to please the eye.

The traditional technique involves cutting a stem

near its base, leaving a section of bark and sapwood, ensuring that growth continues, then laying it down at an angle. The craft stimulates new growth from the cut stem, known as the pleacher, and the stool. Additional strength is gained by placing upright stakes at intervals, and the use of other stakes laid horizontally and bound with brash cut from the pleachers. Occasional stronger stems are left uncut, to develop as 'standards', giving height. Hymn writer, Sydney Carter, expressed something of

Hymn writer, Sydney Carter, expressed something of the same in his Easter hymn of new life, Lord of the dance:

They cut me down and I leapt up high; I am the life that'll never, never, die;



I'll live in you if you live in me; I am the Lord of the dance, said he.

I wonder what signs of Easter you've seen? What sign of Easter you may be?

As part of our mission to care for the wonder of God's creation, the URC is promoting:

'The Big One' – Climate protest, from 21 April

Christian Climate Action, Extinction Rebellion and other climate groups are inviting all who care about our planet to be part of a protest in Parliament Square, Westminster, to call on the UK government to take more action on its environmental commitments. They aim to harness people power by building relationships of inclusion and cooperation.

They say: "Gathering at the Houses of Parliament day after day in large numbers means we can leave the locks, glue and paint behind and instead demonstrate faith in a critical mass of people to create a moment that's impossible to ignore.

The invitation is to all people, all movements, all organisations to come together and stay for as long as you can."

Nonviolent direct action is a form of protest or activism that involves the use of peaceful, nonviolent tactics to bring about social, political, or economic change. Christian Climate Action are holding a 'No Faith In Fossil Fuels Service' at St Johns Church Waterloo, they are gathering at 11am, for the service to start at noon. After the service, they will walk together towards Parliament, via Shell headquarters, to join The Big One protest.

Services for Holy Week and Easter

Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday, which is on Thursday 6th April this year, is the day during Holy Week when the Church traditionally remembers Jesus meeting with his friends, the disciples, in an Upper Room, to celebrate Passover. It is this same meal that

we celebrate as his last supper.

A joint service, with Holy Communion, has been arranged for members and friends of local URCs, including Emmanuel URC, West Wickham, Elmers End Free Church, Hayes Free Church and Bromley URC, Widmore Road.

This is being held at Emmanuel at 7pm on Thursday 6th April. The service will be conducted by Revd David Pickering, with the sermon preached by Revd Dr Elaine Colechin, minister of Bromley URC.

In addition, Elaine, and Revd Alison Smith, minister of Hayes Free Church, have arranged two online acts of worship:

A Tenebrae Service

This is a stark rite that is characterised by the gradual extinguishing of candles between eight brief readings from the gospels, which describe the gathering gloom and the casting of shadows that darken the hours between the Last Supper and the Passion of Christ. This will be led by the Revd Alison Smith and the Revd Dr Elaine Colechin and will be available at https://www.youtube.com/@greenwichandbromleyURC.

A Silent Communion

For those who would like to sit at the Lord's table in the comfort of their own home.

This will be presided over by the Revd Alison Smith and will be available at https://www.youtube.com/@greenwichandbromleyURC.

These have been put together as alternatives to our in-person Service of Holy Communion. However, the Tenebrae Service will complement the Communion service and so can be used as a time of reflection between Maundy Thursday evening and Easter Sunday morning.

Good Friday

Churches Together in West Wickham are holding a Good Friday Service at 11am at St Francis whilst at the same time a range of children's activities are being offered in St Francis Church Hall.

Holy Saturday

On Holy Saturday, 8th April, an Easter Egg hunt and make an Easter Garden activity are being held at Emmanuel from 10:30am. See separate poster on page 24.

Easter Day



Our service on Easter Day Celebration Service is at 11am and will be preceded from 10:30am with the singing of Easter hymns and songs in the garden together with the decoration of the cross to herald the resurrection. The service will include Holy Communion and an anthem from our Singing Group.

URC's 50th Anniversary – revised arrangements for Saturday 15th April 2023 There will be an 'Open Church House' event at 86 Tavistock Place, WC1H 9RT, which will take place on April 15th from 10am-12 noon. At Methodist Central Hall Westminster, London, from 2.30pm, where the Uniting Assembly of the URC took place in October 1972, a **service** will take place to **give thanks and to celebrate** the five decades of the United Reformed Church. Taxi Scheme

The Gift of Grace facilitation group originally declined the request for a taxi service, however, at the last Church meeting and AGM on 29th January this decision was reversed.

The Elders have looked carefully at all the names in the Church Directory and we are now in a position to offer to pay for a taxi for members of our congregation who are unable to get to Emmanuel without relying on a lift from someone. This scheme is to provide an option should a lift not be available and starts with immediate effect.

Everyone on 'the list' will have, or will shortly have, received a letter giving them full details as to how the scheme works.

Because we have no way of knowing how this is going to work out we are initially offering this as a pilot scheme which will run for three months, and will then be reviewed by the Elders. Hopefully it will prove to be successful and we will be able to continue to run it, but as we are still testing the water we will, for now, only be able to fund journeys to and from Sunday Church and Tuesday Fellowship.

And it occurred to us that perhaps people might like a copy for home if they don't already have one? If so, please take one from the tables in the James Todd room during April, or if you're not going to be in church please talk to your Elder who will make arrangements for you.

Also, it's been a long time since the library was used, and we don't see any real likelihood of that coming back. Rather than just cart off all the books to a second-hand book shop, we thought we'd first offer them out to the fellowship. There's far too many to list here, so we will put them on tables in the James Todd room during April, and you're welcome to browse and take away anything that attracts you.

Eco Hints Round 3: April 2023

Loft insulation. Yes, boring old loft insulation.

It's actually one of the most effective solutions for improving the energy efficiency of a home - the Energy Saving Trust advises that about a quarter of a house's heat is lost through uninsulated loft space. And I was shocked to discover recently that around 8 million of Great Britain's 25 million homes still don't have any loft insulation. Wow.

We've just done it in the loft voids above the Lang Room and Ministers Vestry which has taken us from no insulation to a layer 250mm (10 inches) thick. It's pretty straightforward as a DIY job, no special tools or knowledge, just time and care.

We chose to use a product called Thermafleece Supasoft, which is made from recycled drinks bottles. This is entirely safe and easy to handle. Most DIY stores only sell rolls made of glass mineral wool, which is much cheaper to buy, but is notorious for being awkward to handle (face mask, gloves, long sleeves etc).

Perhaps you think you already have loft insulation? Well, back when retrofitting loft insulation was last in fashion (probably around the 1970s & 80s!?), it was common to put in about 100-120mm (4-5inches) filling the space between rafters. But that still leaves a huge gap to current standards – which are 250-270mm (10-11 inches). It's a bit like the difference between a summer weight duvet and a winter weight one. So let's change the question slightly - do you have *enough* insulation?

So maybe take a look in your loft space and see where you stand? And don't forget to look at the loft hatch itself – is that insulated or just plain board?

PS – we slightly over-ordered how much loft insulation we needed for the Lang/Vestry, so if you would like to buy some of the excess - maybe half a roll or enough just to do that loft hatch? - please have a word with lan Moore.
