# Míníster's Letter

#### Retreating to a quiet corner

Dear Friends,

The summer months of July and August can be a quieter time. Some experience a pause from their usual roles and responsibilities. Schools and universities break up for the summer holidays, and at our church, the Pre-School, Brownies and those who work in the education sector each take a well-deserved break. For others, summer may give space to slow down, perhaps enjoy a break or holiday, or to simply retreat, whether for an hour, a day or a week or two, to a quiet corner, seeking the peace of God.

One of my favourite one-liners from the gospels tells of Jesus retreating. Related by Mark, the evangelist describes a hectic and demanding 24 hours in the life of Jesus. Mark first tells of Jesus going to the synagogue and teaching, then of going to the home of Peter in Capernaum where his mother-in-law is poorly. Jesus heals her. Soon word gets out, and by evening it was as if the whole town was braying at their door, making demands, 'heal me', 'cure me'. Naturally, Jesus responded with compassionate care.

I cannot believe other than when the last person had eventually left, and Jesus was able to retire to bed, he did so physically and mentally pooped. Then Mark tells what Jesus did next, in one of my favourite one-liners:

*In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed.* (Mark 1:35).

Jesus wanted time out. I imagine that he knew the new day would bring fresh crowds, fresh demands, fresh expectations. Ahead of this, the humanity of his nature needed to connect with the divine. He sought to immerse himself in the presence of God, the true ground of his being.

This May, Jan and I were blessed by having a fortnight on the Hebridean Isle of Mull. It was a retreat from our usual life and role, time together, time to wander, watching wildlife and time to wonder, drinking in the beauty of God's gift of creation. Our days included a boat trip to the Treshnish Isles; you can read about a birding encounter with some monk-like creatures in this month's nature ramblings piece.

We also had a day on lona, a holy isle, which George MacLeod, founder of the modern-day lona Community, described as a 'thin place where only tissue paper separates the material from the spiritual'. First we walked to St Columba's Bay at the southern end of the isle, where Columba is reputed to have landed to establish the early monastic community. Along the way we were serenaded by the call of the cuckoo and the rasp of the elusive corncrake.

On reaching the Bay it was good to pause, taking time to eat our sandwiches and drink in the vista. I found myself trying to picture Columba and his fellow monks landing; then wondered at the faith which moved them in their discipleship in life. Columba became the first Abbot of the monastic community, doubtless a demanding role. Like Jesus, he would take time out to retreat in prayer with God.

It was on such a holy isle that a dear friend of ours, Karen Gardiner, wrote a reflection on an experience of being touched by God, I've reproduced it below. I hope that through the summer months we'll experience some more sunshine, and that you, and each person within our fellowship, whatever their situation, may find some time, whether a week, a day, or an hour to do their own retreat. Perhaps a quiet place, whether in a garden or local park, and experience the wonder of nature and the deep peace of God.

Travel well, travel gently, travel with refreshing pauses through the journey of life,

#### South London Synod Area Meeting 17<sup>th</sup> June 2023 and the next meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> September

John Campbell published a wonderful hymn collection called *Songs to Shake Us Up* in 2016, some of which he presented to our Synod Area a few years ago. From his previous church in Tottenham (before that he was Principal of Northern College, Manchester) he has now crossed the Thames to share ministry at Crossway, Elephant & Castle (where Sue was Church Secretary, and Bryn Interim Minister for a couple of years).

As 'one of us' now, he was invited to provide the Opening Devotions. He got us going with an *Alleluia* not unlike the *Halle-halle-halle-halle-* we sang at Emmanuel recently (following its use at the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Service in April). Then we sang a great new hymn that he had written for our main speaker, Rev Fiona Thomas, and her churches. It reminded me of another meaningful hymn *Let us build a house where love can dwell.* You can read it, or hum along to the tune *St Columba (Put peace into each other's hands),* printed in after this article.

Fiona Thomas had been Training Officer for Thames North Synod and then Secretary for Education and Learning at Church House. Now Interim Minister at three churches in Lewisham, she is encouraging them to examine their church life under SOAR\* headings: Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations and Resources/Results. (This is similar to the approach adopted by Jo Patterson for us last year.) Fiona had observed that in churches there was a natural sharing of friendliness, but that often people did not know each other well: for example, not being aware of simple things like their job, or children, or interests etc.

So we found someone we did not already know in the Synod Area and Fiona got us engaged in paired conversations, with simple hints on how to extend the dialogue, like: *Tell me more! Who else was involved? What were you thinking? How did it feel?* We asked each other three questions: *What gave us encouragement during the Covid days? What did our church let go of? What did our church learn to do that we have taken forward since?* It just felt good to realise that we got to know a fellow URC person better, in a relaxed and unembarrassed way. We were able to enter into a deeper level of conversation about things that really mattered to us.

As usual at Synod Area meetings, we had received reports by email in advance and had been encouraged to follow up any queries with the committee convenor concerned, thus reducing to a minimum the time spent on business matters. There were a few items for which we were asked to approve the committees' recommendations. The next South London Synod Area meeting will be in the evening: **Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> September at 6pm at East Croydon URC** – with pizza provided(!) The excellent speaker will be the Revd Fiona Bennett, Moderator of General Assembly 2022-23. There is an interesting article about her and her colleague the Moderator of the Church of Scotland, the Rt Revd Sally Foster-Fulton, in the July/August edition of *Reform*.

**Meetings are open: do come along** – parking at the church for people with mobility needs (otherwise limited, or use Fairfield parking). Or the 119 bus makes it easy. The church is in Addiscombe Grove, scarcely 100 yards from East Croydon station, trams and buses.

### Nature ramblings – Off to Mull

This month (and perhaps the next one or two) nature ramblings is going off to Mull. For as I wrote in my letter, Jan and I enjoyed a fortnight there in mid-May, including a boat trip to the Treshnish Isles, a string of isles including the largest, Lunga, which is a national nature reserve. Set in the Atlantic off the west seaboard of Mull, Lunga is home to pupping seals in the Autumn, and can feel bleak and storm swept through the winter months. But as Spring breaks in April, flowers emerge in the hues of bluebell and primrose and a variety of seabirds return from deep in the Atlantic, to nest, rear and fledge their young in the summer days, before Autumn gales return.



Lunga hosts the reptilian shag, the gull-like dainty kittiwakes with inky-black tips to their wings and four members of the auk family. Razorbills (600-700 individuals), guillemots (around 8000-10000 individuals), black guillemots (around 50 individuals), and to everyone's delight, puffins (about 2600 individuals). Together they form quite a squawking colony!

Pictured from our visit is the comical looking puffin.

Puffins are an oceanic bird, which spend around 8 months of the year at sea.

Their stubby wings are designed for underwater propulsion allowing them to readily catch fish, including sand eels, in their bill. By contrast, on land they can appear a little ungainly, and when flying out to sea, decidedly frantic.

Puffins live in community, but what can first appear as neighbourly chats can erupt into territorial disputes. A characteristic not confined to the bird world!

They have a link in name with St Columba, who along with 12 monks, established the monastic



community on Iona, a short puffin flight from Lunga. For their scientific name is *Fratercula arctica*, which means 'little friar', or 'little brother of the north', a reference to their plumage which is said to resemble a monk's attire. Both puffin and monk wandered the oceans, one with prayer and one with poise, one with a heart moved, one moving heart.



### Eco Hints Round 6: July 2023

#### **S**AVING WATER

We can't deny that Global warming is affecting our UK weather and causing hotter, drier summers.

The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) warns that our use of water must decrease if we are to save wildlife habitats. Yes! 70% of our tap water comes from freshwater sources in nature \*.

Here are some tips from South East Water to save water and start making a difference:

- 1. Have shorter showers: aim for 4 minutes
- 2. Use water butts instead of sprinklers or a hosepipe
- 3. Turn off the tap while brushing teeth or shaving
- 4. Collect water from the hot tap while it's warming up use on the garden or to wash the car
- 5. Fill your dishwasher before switching it on
- 6. Use unfinished drinks, ice cubes and leftover water from drink bottles to water plants
- 7. Turn off taps properly and fix leaks as soon as they occur
- 8. Report leaks in the streets as soon as possible
