Míníster's Letter

In praise of synergy!

Dear Friends,

Hats off to the lionesses, England's Women's national football team, for achieving what they have 'down under' in the 2023 World Cup. Their success is down to talented and dedicated players and the competence of their manager, Sarina Wiegman, together with her chosen support squad. Indeed, both Sarina and her counterpart, Gareth Southgate – manager of the men's team, have become widely respected for the competence and conduct on and off the pitch. They have each created a sense of synergy in their team, in contrast to many Premier League managers, whose average staying power is a whisker over two years and where last year many didn't last the season.

Have you ever wondered if you could do better as manager of a Premier League team? Well, not exactly the same, but believe it or not, there are millions who take on that role week by week through the season! How is that you may well ask? The answer, through participating in the online game called Fantasy Football.

So how does that work? At the beginning of the season you can sign up as a manager with £100 million to spend on 15 players who play in actual Premiership teams with certain numbers of goalkeepers, defenders, midfielders and forwards. Whilst £100 million can buy some good players, choices have to be made as the budget isn't enough to cram a team with top stars.

With your team formed and once the season opens, your squad gains points according to how your chosen players actually perform week by week. Points are awarded for appearing, scoring or assisting goals, and for keeping a clean sheet. Points are deducted for conceding goals and naughty behaviour marked by a yellow or red card. Ahead of each game you select a team of eleven from your squad, pick a captain and vice captain, who may be awarded additional points, and you can also do some 'wheeler-dealing', buying and selling players, within your available budget.

It's a bit of fun which I confess to have half-heartedly dabbled in. The fun comes from being part of a mini-league of family and friends or workmates. I'm in one called 'Premier Picks' managed by my brother Martin. Sad to say I gave

precious little time to managing it through the season (none actually!) so finished in a merited lowly position. I failed as a manager to bring any synergy.

My team is just a fantasy team. It only exists on paper. My team doesn't meet to train together week by week, nor to encourage support or challenge one another. They lack synergy – that is the human interaction that creates a sum greater than the parts.

Synergy can be found in various groups such as choirs, orchestras or bands who find synergy when they come together and play. If their leader is pleased, then great pleasure may be experienced. Synergy doesn't mean that everyone plays or sings the right notes, rather the outcome is greater than the sum of the individual parts.

Synergy can be found in church as well. Someone once challenged me.... I believe in God, I try to be a good Christian, why should I bother coming to church? For me the answer is synergy. For at its best a church is a place where people come together and find themselves enthused and challenged, supported and, at times, comforted. Church is a place of worship, but it is much more, as the Apostle Paul writes, it is joining and feeling a party of Christ's body, where together we are far more than our individual parts.

Jesus knew he couldn't bring in God's Kingdom on his own, he needed support. So he challenged a 'rag tag' group to follow him, and they became disciples and friends. It wasn't all sweetness and light. There was jealousy, hard-heartedness and even betrayal, but there was also commitment, enthusiasm and zeal. With Jesus in their midst, they had real synergy.

Our church, like many churches, is a collection of individuals with different gifts and different natures. Inevitably there will be challenging times, but more importantly, our church, is greater than the sum of our individual parts. Our synergy comes through our worship and life together and through the presence of God's Holy Spirit - Christian synergy.

I don't know how my fantasy team will perform this year, poorly I suspect based on my failure to invest (waste?) time managing them! But then they lacked synergy, that special quality to keep going through challenges and reach to great things.

Jesus's mission started with a handful of local workers – mingled with God's calling and presence, and look what happened!

I don't know what the coming year holds for our church, but I hope that through the influence of God's Spirit, with Jesus informing our minds and moving hearts, Christian synergy may help us to be a place where together we can find our lives enriched and make a big difference for Christ's sake. I hope, too, that through our witness, others may be enthused to join team Emmanuel, and we benefit from people exercising their skills and enthusiasm across the mission pitch!!! And remember, there is no limit on the number of people allowed to join our fellowship!

On which note, it is great that in this new season, we will be formally welcoming the 8th West Wickham, as they move their Head Quarters to Emmanuel as a sponsored group. We will give the whole group a formal welcome at our children and youth-themed Harvest Parade Service at 10:30am on Sunday 24th September.

As the nights start to draw in, and Strictly appears on Saturday nights again, may you know God's presence encompassing you through the glow of early Autumn days.

Dear Friends,

When will normal service be resumed?

As we are writing this letter and closing off the URC's accounts for 2022, the country is still torn with industrial disputes, mostly notably with Health Service workers, rail industry workers, teachers etc. etc. Whatever your view as to the wisdom or justice of such action, we suspect all of us are affected by the disruption to some degree.

In church life too, are we back to "normal life"? Some churches no doubt have returned to something like their pre-Covid level of activity and attendance numbers. Quite a few have recommenced their activity but find their numbers have reduced. Some churches have found re-opening too difficult and have decided to close.

Whatever the "new normal" was to be, we suggest its arrival has (like many trains) been disrupted, delayed, or cancelled all together. The URC's finance officers had concerns that the late arrival of the return to normality would impact very significantly on the giving to the M&M Fund in 2022. However, the churches responded magnificently and the giving to M&M was £600,000 ahead of budget. It was also only 2.5% down on 2021's result.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2022 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With normal service not yet resumed, 2023 is not going to be an easy year either. We now have the added disruption of high inflation, pushing up wages and overhead costs. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God?

Again, thank you all!

INSIGHTS FROM THE URC AT 50

As the URC prepared to turn 50 years old last year, it commissioned a study by the independent Christian think tank, Theos, to conduct research into the life, identity, and flourishing of our Church. The key objective being to provide a snapshot of the URC today, exploring its identity rooted in practice, what flourishing looks like, what resources exist or need to be sought, and what barriers there are to flourishing in the future.

After a year of in depth research, the following summary paints a picture of 6 key lessons or insights about URC life that it identified. Settle yourself down for a thoughtful read. I'd be interested to know if you think that any of them may ring true for our church?

Church at a crossroads: 6 lessons from the URC - from a report by Theos

1. The church is not always about numbers

The 2021 census data on religion is sobering. The number of people 'checking out' from religion is on the rise. This is a truth, but it is not the whole truth. Indeed, the picture of faith in the UK is more nuanced; the landscape more complex than polling numbers and headlines suggest. While the URC is undeniably experiencing decline and contributes to the sobering national statistics, the lived reality is that very frequently small congregations have a disproportionate impact within their local communities.

In towns, villages and cities across the three nations the URC exists within it is in partnership with many others at local level, meeting community needs and serving Christ, as it serves those beyond its walls. Our research found that for 71% of United Reformed churches, community service is their first priority – a concern that trumps even pastoral care of their own members. So, while the figures and headlines paint a picture of doom and decline, small, even struggling congregations continue to do what they do best: quietly love their neighbours in practical ways and nurture community.

This is not only true of the URC: Church Urban Fund data in 2017 showed that 93% of Church of England churches at that time were involved in some way in the provision of food banks, and other more recent Theos reports have highlighted the impressive impact of local churches on social cohesion and practical care for the most vulnerable in their communities.

2. Historical theological commitments continue to affect modern church politics

The URC is the result of the merger of the Congregational Church in England and Wales with the Presbyterian Church in England in 1972, with later unions with the Churches of Christ and the Congregational Church of Scotland. The distinctive congregationalist and reformed theologies which underpin the uniting churches continue to influence it in important ways. For example, the congregational ethos can be seen in the way normally individual local members, rather than central leadership, make the decision to start or close a local congregation. Indeed, while the broader structures of the denomination are clearly indebtedness to the reformed tradition, the congregational spirit of equality and inclusive participation in decision–making pervades the denomination.

This highlights the fact that churches are not merely secular organisations, but are driven by their unique faith commitments in all that they do. It is perhaps more accurate to view the church's social witness as "social liturgy" than "social action", reflecting its "deliberately God–focused" motivation in service to others.

More broadly, the popular image of Christianity in the UK draws on a highly idealised view of the traditional Anglican parish: a single priest of a single church, overseeing a clearly defined geographical area and directly accountable to a hierarchical structure above it. But not all churches operate a parochial system, and the URC is just one example of the various ways different Christian communities organise themselves.

3. Disagreeing well is a strength

The URC at its core finds ways to live into significant diversity whilst remaining united. Its approach to same–sex marriage is an example of this. Whilst not without difficulty or frustration at times, people with different perspectives on issues of human sexuality live side by side as siblings. In a societal context where

such issues are often framed as a 'culture war', the URC offers a profoundly counter–cultural reality in holding together difference. Concretely, the approach taken was to trust and allow local churches to make their own decision on same–sex marriage, rather than impose a church–wide position from the 'centre'.

4. Church structures developed when the church was larger need reassessing

One of the key findings of our research was that the structures and processes of the URC need simplifying and streamlining. Conceived when the denomination was significantly larger, structures that were once fit for purpose now risk stifling rather than enabling congregational life and mission. As many historic denominations with elaborate governance and administrative structures experience decline, the need to reform structures discerningly, to be more agile and fit for mission in changing times, is critical.

The URC is not alone in considering how its structures can best serve the needs of the church and community in the twenty–first century. The Church of England has particularly attracted mainstream media attention as it considers the balance between central structures and the parish level. The Quakers are engaged in a "Simpler Meetings" scheme to reduce the burden of structures and roles on the worshipping community. More positively, this reassessment is not always motivated by decline, as in the case of Pope Francis's declaration that "synodality [is what] God expects of the Church of the third millennium", calling the international Catholic Church to an inclusive process of discernment regarding how its culture, structures, and decision–making can be more open to the leadings of the Holy Spirit. These movements are not intended to bring about complete transformation of church structures, but rather seek to be agile and imaginative in the face of modern challenges.

5. Ministers and paid time make a real difference

There is a shortage of ministers in the URC. Ministers are stretched untenably between several congregations and localities. The minister—to—church ratio varies from synod to synod, but in one of the synods we studied, the ratio was approximately 20 ministers to 100 churches. Our research shows that the absence of a full–time minister has a negative effect on the congregational life and ministry of local congregations, limiting particularly their ability to meet the needs of their

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local communities through outreach activities. On the flipside, all of the churches we studied that thrived had a minister.

In a context of church decline, however, there is a need to innovate both at the level of theological training, improving quality and access, and building lay capacity for a more agile, participatory form of local leadership.

Other Theos research has also emphasised the critical importance of investing in leadership – not only for the flourishing of the church, but for the good of the whole community. Churches are wellsprings of formal and informal community leadership, forming (and paying) community champions who take initiative and empower their neighbourhoods, building up 'dignity' and a sense of 'purpose' in individuals and groups.

6. The church will flourish at the local level or not at all

Flourishing churches we came across in the research had a clear understanding of why they existed in their localities as churches. They could articulate their mission in both spiritual and social terms. They were outward oriented, and maintained active relationship with their local communities.

As older, historic denominations reckon with the reality of decline, the promise of flourishing rests with a renewed sense of missional identity and purpose expressed locally, and the courage to drastically reform or jettison altogether wider denominational structures and processes that hinder rather than enable congregational life and mission.

Nature ramblings – Off to Mull – all creatures great and small!

For the last couple of months Nature Ramblings visited two isles off Mull, Lunga in July to spot puffins and Ulva in August for insectivorous plants. For September's edition we're loitering a little longer in the Hebrides, this time on the Isle of Mull itself.

Whilst Mull is well known for the so-called big five, comprising Red Deer, Otter, Sea Eagle, Atlantic Seal and any one of the creatures of the deep, whether basking shark, whale, dolphin or porpoise, all of which can regularly be seen on or from Mull, the isle has some smaller residents, too. To draw on a line from the hymn 'All things bright and beautiful', Mull has both creatures 'great', and creatures 'small'.

The small category includes beetles. There are nearly 400 species of ground beetles in Britain which vary in size from 2 to 30 mm, that's around an 1/8th inch to 1¹/₄ inches in old money. Their characteristics include having long antennae and long legs and typically elongated oval bodies. They vary in colour from black through many bright metallic colours, with some variation within the same species. I'm no expert on beetles, but if I spot one, I enjoy taking a photo and seeing if I can identify it from a guide. It's a fun way of discovering and learning a little more about the wonders of creation.



With that caveat of my decidedly 'amateur' status, I think that the beetle on the left is the Copper Greenclock (*Poecilus cupreus*) and the one below is the Green tiger beetle

(*Cincindela campestris*) Beetles don't get the best press in the Bible, for they are typically linked with plagues and pestilence. Whilst it is so that some beetles have a penchant for eating crops and produce including leaves, grain and



flour, they also eat some species which are themselves regarded as pests.

A more positive Biblical approach is to draw on the opening story of creation, where we are reminded that alongside the birds of the air, the wild animals of the earth and great sea beasts, God created everything that creeps along the ground.

Many people go to Mull hoping to see the so-called big five, but there is wonder and delight to be found in the small creatures, too. It is a watchword when out walking, whether on Mull or nearer home, to not only look up and around, but to look down, too.

Scouts are back at Emmanuel



Scouting at Emmanuel has a long tradition – a tradition with a bright future with the 8th West Wickham Scout Group moving its headquarters to Emmanuel.

For the longest time the West Wickham URC had a Scout group. Unfortunately, that group lost too many members and leaders in the aftermath of the Covid pandemic and had to close down. More or less at the same time we, the 8th West Wickham Scout Group, lost our home of well over half a century because the West Wickham Methodist Church is closing down as well.

Putting these two negatives together results, however, in a massive plus: a thriving Scout Group with over 100 Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Explorers and around 20 adult leaders moving its headquarters into a thriving church. And while the move was stressful – as all moves are –, we have been made incredibly welcome by everyone involved and we would like to say thank you for this. We are sure that we will have many good years in The Grove.

Our first event at Emmanuel has been the Summer Fair in July where our Cub and Beaver leaders ran a small stall – and where one of our Beaver leaders, Helen, won a cow called Flossie, who has since become a Beaver herself (as you can see from her green-and-red scarf).

From September onwards our sections' meet as follows:

- Beavers: (6-8 years old): Thursdays, 18:00–19:00;
- Cubs (8-10¹/₂ years old): Mondays, 19:00–20:15;
- Scouts (10¹/₂-14 years old): Tuesdays, 19:45–21:00;
- Explorers (14-18 years old): Tuesdays, 19:45–21:30.



All sections meet in the Richmond Hall, except for the Explorers who meet in the Griffiths Jones Hall.


Many of his tips are actually a good common-sense approach to life: Care for the environment, be considerate to others, and have a less self-centred approach.


