

Minister's Letter

Can the fundamentalists win?

Dear Friends

As I write the first anniversary of the apparent murder of Mahsa Amini within an Iranian gaol is in the news. Her seeming 'crime' being failing to conform to state proscribed dress codes for women. A year on from the peoples' revolt, and fundamentalism still holds sway in her nation.

Fundamentalism is alive and well in other nations too. We see it in the Taliban-governed Afghanistan 2 years on from their retaking of control, and manifested in the increasing restrictions in society, particularly on women and girls, robbing them of many basic human rights.

And whilst now 22 years on, September witnessed the anniversary of socalled 9/11. The day four hi-jacked planes became people-filled weapons, loaded with fuel and fuelled with hate.

Perhaps you, like me, can remember where you were that day. I was in Belfast. I remember seeing the images on repeat of the planes hitting the twin towers, of the explosions and devastating collapse, the desperation shown by the 'jumpers', then as the days turned, these images giving way to tear-streaked faces, the growing roll call of names and abiding heartache. It was a stark reminder to the world of the ability of fundamentalism to foster hate and hurt and justify the worst of atrocities.

It was reported that the hijackers chanted the name of Allah as they hit the Twin Towers. Without wishing to press comparisons, many were also uneasy about a seemingly fundamentalist response in the declaration of a swath of nations and humanity as being an axis of evil.

From my privileged western liberal perspective, it can be easy to call out such horrific acts. But I wonder if in moments of honesty we may identify some fundamentalist tendencies in other nations, including our own? And not just in one faith but appreciate that elements of fundamentalism are alive in all faiths, yes, including Christianity.

So what are the characteristics of fundamentalism? A study of fundamentalism in the US identified the following, that fundamentalism:

- claims orthodoxy, and perceives itself to be the recipient and protector of the one true faith,
- is reactive including against what it sees as modern secularism,
- is selective, choosing certain texts to support certain beliefs, rejecting other texts which contradict an ideology,
- fears academic liberty and is generally suspicious of modern scholarship,
- is simplistic, tending to define issues in terms of light and dark, right and wrong, good and evil, heaven and hell; leaving little room for paradox, inconsistency, parable, allegory or metaphor; and
- tends towards absolutism and certainty.

Critically and vitally, there are other approaches to faith, other understandings of God than those held by fundamentalists – of whatever religion, These include faith practice that embraces intellect, reasoning and is open to new insights, which values scientific discovery and is characterised by a freedom from what might be described as dogmatic teaching based on literally understood so-called truths.

But lest I fall into the trap of fundamentalist 'bashing' and in doing so become fundamentalist myself, I need to remind myself of some words of US preacher Harry Fosdick:

'there are many opinions of the fundamentalists of which I am not sure whether they are right or wrong. But there is one thing that I am sure of – courtesy and kindliness and tolerance and humility and fairness are right.'

Fosdick also wrote pleading for

'a clear insight into the main issues of modern Christianity and a sense of penitent shame that the Christian Church should be quarrelling over little matters when the world is dying of great needs'

The prophet Micah wrote of our calling to: 'Do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God'

So can the fundamentalists win?

In a world in which religious and political fundamentalism still appears alive and well, it feels increasingly important to hold onto the words of Jesus in our hearts, to love God and love neighbour, and to live out such teaching with tolerance, love, kindness and understanding. That includes the appreciation that many world religions, and their followers, not least Islam, have a sense of divine goodness and love etched in their heart which shapes lives and enriches community. By holding to such tenets, the fundamentalists will never ultimately win.

So can the fundamentalists win?

There will continue to be dark days around the world where people will experience the heartache and horror of terrorism or fundamentalist rule. Yet whenever a tear-streaked face is comforted in unconditional love, wherever forgiveness, healing and reconciliation can be found, wherever love is more powerful than intolerance, then God is present, and fundamentalism cannot win the day.

Further, fundamentalism will struggle to take grip if such open, inclusive love is lived out in every local church, in every local community, including ours.

As the days cool and evenings lengthen, may you know the loving warmth of God in home and heart.



Friends,

Is it the end of September already? How the summer has flown by! While we had a bit of a summer break after General Assembly, the past few weeks have been rather busy!

First up was Greenbelt, a Christian festival held near Kettering, where the URC now has a significant presence, running a rather cheap (and therefore popular) café and the youth zone for young people aged 11-17. I was volunteering in this venue, where there is both a space for young people to just hang out, and a dedicated programmed venue. I had a lot of fun at the festival with my friends, and it was great to serve young people for the weekend. Volunteering involved hanging out with the young people, selling them very underpriced sweets and drinks, helping to run the programmed events, and stopping adults from coming in to the venue!

After that, I was off to Glasgow for the third Youth Exec weekend of the year. Again, it was great to see everyone again, and we had a very fruitful time planning Youth Assembly and discussing the Youth Review. This Review had been commissioned by Youth Assembly two years ago, and it is now our job to go over their comments and suggestions, and start to take action to address it. We also almost all tried battered mars bars!

A week later and I went to a Churches Together in England conference on ecumenism. It was great to meet people from lots of different denominations and discuss the successes and challenges we are facing, especially with the other young people there. CTE are currently trying to set up a youth collective, with a potential view to hosting a national event, or expanding a current one to be more ecumenical, and I'm very interested to be involved in this ongoing work. I even got to be involved in a panel for young ecumenists which was an incredible opportunity, and while a lot of what we were saying felt like preaching to the choir, it was good to talk about especially national youth work as it works slightly differently to the local and regional ecumenism that a lot of the conference was talking about.

Its very encouraging to hear about the work that's happening, especially based on the paper we took to General Assembly.

Nature ramblings - a quiz, and meet some shieldbugs



First up a quiz... how old are the stems that have sprung from this recumbent tree trunk taken in nearby Hutchinson's Bank Reserve?

In August Jan and I had a trip north, including staying with some old friends in County Durham, with whom we enjoyed a walk in a nature reserve. Here we spotted the Red-legged Shieldbug (below right). I was particularly interested having just bought a 400 plus page book on Shieldbugs (as Jan well knows, I can be a nature nerd). Thankfully, our hosts are even more nature nerdy, their idea of nightlife being to go out as dusk falls to set a moth trap!



So with light lit and moths buzzing, we retreated indoors, emerging the next morning to see what had been enticed in. Amongst a collection of moths was a Hairy Shieldbug (left). I'll return to moths another month!



Both species of shieldbug are named after their legs! The Red-legged Shieldbug does indeed have red legs, and also distinctive curved hook-shaped pronotal corners, like those shoulder pads sported by female power-dressers in the 1980s Dynasty and Dallas tv shows. Its cousin, the Hairy Shieldbug, has, yes, distinctively hairy legs. I don't suppose Joan Collins would have publicly sported this characteristic!

Shieldbugs are classed as true bugs, for they suck, unlike beetles which bite. Within their class are bedbugs. Hmmm. But fear not, whilst the mouth parts of shieldbugs are designed to pierce succulent leaves, they don't feed on animals,

including us humans.

More attractively, they sport a shieldlike back, often glossy and brightly coloured, giving them an heraldic, almost regal look. They are versatile in movement, being able to walk with a distinct gait and take to the wing with a whirr. They can be seen across Britain. I've spotted them in the manse garden, and perhaps they can be found, in season, in a garden near you. If you spot one next summer, try and take a photo and we can identify it together. For me they are but one wonder of God's glorious creation.

And the age of those stems growing from the fallen giant? 36 years. The tree came down in the great storm of 1987. After destruction came new growth. Isn't nature wonderful.

Election of Elders

Emmanuel is to hold a short Church Meeting on Sunday 10th December for the election of new Elders for a four year term starting in January 2024. These new Elders will then be inducted, or ordained and inducted if appropriate, at a Sunday morning service in January.

First, the admin bit...

This year, we have one Elder who has reached the end of their current 4 year term, namely Rosemary Daniels. Rosemary has agreed to serve for a further period. However we are looking for at least an additional 2 new Elders.

Nomination forms will be available in both vestibules or available from an Elder and must be returned to Rosemary no later than <u>Sunday 26th November</u>.

Second, what does it mean to be called to be an Elder?

There's a small booklet produced by the URC ("They've asked me to be an Elder") which has recently been updated and reprinted and is aimed at answering exactly this question, It describes in practical terms what is expected of Elders as a key part of the church leadership team — working with the minister and sharing responsibility for the spiritual oversight of the congregation.

For those who haven't been Elders before, there's often an acute sense of the unknown, of not being equipped for the role, To which, there's a lovely quote in the booklet which says: "Daunted? Don't be!"



Eldership is a privilege as well as a responsibility, It is an enriching ministry for those who do it and those who benefit from it, We invite anyone who is considering the suggestion to be an Elder, to come and talk about it further. We also hope members may consider approaching someone and asking if they might consider being nominated.

Eco Hints Round 9: October 2023

Repair

The idea of repairing things seems to have gone out of fashion over the last couple of generations, So many "things" have become

...too difficult to repair yourself (eg cars),

....or you can't get spare parts (kitchen white goods),

.....or people just haven't ever learnt the skills (sewing/clothing) or it's just so much cheaper to throw it away and buy a new one (electronics).

But as "The Repair Shop" on TV shows us, there are so many things which can actually be repaired, And we should celebrate that, and encourage it, because making repairs is a fantastic way to a lighter carbon footprint.



Recently, as part of church maintenance programme, we had the shed doors in the organ alley repaired by the folk at Penge Sheds, The wood was rotting from the bottom up, but it's all now been renewed, and with a nice new lick of paint, should be good for another 15-20 years.

Like many eco tips, it's a win-win outcome, We get "as new" shed doors, the reclaimed timber used for the job gets a second use, and we didn't end up throwing lots of old stuff away into landfill, Add in the fact that people like Mhindi and Jon at Penge Sheds get a huge amount of satisfaction from using their skills and time to deliver a job-well done, and it all cost probably a lot less than half the price of some new doors, and actually it ends up sounding like a 5-way win!

So here's this month's tips, all about getting your repairs done:

- Find and buy spare parts over the internet from websites such as www.espares.co.uk, or look on ebay for the parts you need
- Learn how to do it by watching videos on YouTube particularly good for bike repairs, many of which are quite straightforward and where getting spare parts like a chain or brake blocks is actually very easy and cheap
- Buy from brands which offer lifetime repairs particularly in outdoor clothing, there are brands like Arcteryx and Patagonia which offer this
- If you can't do it yourself, take the item to a volunteer-run repair café, like the
 one at St Francis CofE in Petts Wood (which meets monthly) or the team at
 Penge Sheds (ask me for more details of either)

Tragically they knew deep heartache through the death of their daughter Joanne a few years ago.


