Míníster's Letter

'just like the ones I used to know'

Dear Friends

Bing Crosby's melancholic rendition of White Christmas with the lyrics: 'just like the ones I used to know' evokes a sense of looking back. First released in 1942, it particularly appealed to troops and their families separated by war, reminding them of 'Christmases past' together.

Looking back at 'Christmases past' isn't just a wartime phenomenon. Many people keep Christmas in a traditional way, singing the same carols year after year, sending cards with greetings especially to friends of old, and eating the same food! In our home, doubtless like many, we put up the same decorations year after year, and always in the same place. The most precious ones are those made by our children, their glitter and glue endeavours reminding us of their childhood Christmases past.

And with that sense of 'just like the ones we used to know' Christmas is an occasion when we may find ourselves engaging with the past. An engagement which may help us embrace the season with joy and also approach it with poignancy, not least as we remember loved ones no longer with us.

We're not the first generation to look back to Christmas past. Think of Mary. I don't suppose that she'll ever forget **the** first Christmas (though she didn't know it was the first Christmas at the time!). But I can't believe either that she'd remember the circumstances, far from home, no proper shelter, no family or village matriarchs to support her when her time came. And I imagine that she'd remember the joy and wonder of new life, as the worry and pain dissipated with time.

Matthew introduces his Christmas story by looking back, beginning his gospel with a genealogy of Jesus: 'Jesus the Messiah, the son of David, the son of Abraham'. Having recounted significant figures from the past family of Israel,

Matthew links through to Joseph's own family. In doing so Matthew is honouring the past, telling us that Christianity is grounded in Judaism, the New Testament in the Old Testament, and the good news of the gospel, in the promises of the past.

Matthew's looking back isn't so much nostalgic as thankful, reflecting how God's presence, grace and truth has shaped and led to the first Christmas. And having looked back he looks forward, introducing the wise men, so symbolising how the story will widen far beyond the boundaries of Israel.

As we prepare for Christmas through Advent, may we, like Matthew, remember how God's presence, grace and truth has shaped our lives in the past and brought us to this time.

As we celebrate Christmas, may we, like Mary, have an experience of wonder and joy, of God's promise being delivered, the birth of a baby.

Christmas can evoke a sense of nostalgia and even poignancy. This Christmas our family isn't the only family who'll be shedding a quiet tear of sadness. Christmas can also bring a sense of wonder, including through new life, and our family isn't the only family shedding a joyful tear of delight as the generations naturally turn.

If you happen to hear Bing's melancholic 'just like the ones I used to know', drifting from your radio or down a supermarket aisle, may you be helped to recall not just on our own Christmases past, but the sense of God with us – God with you - Immanuel in the here and now.

Through the joys and delights, poignancy and any sorrows of the season, may you have a sense of God's presence, peace and joy this Christmas, and smile.

Autumn Synod Together Meeting Saturday 21st October at The Temple URC, in St Mary Cray

It's always good to meet with other URC churches and to hear news, hopes, visions, changes and challenges.

Opening worship was led by members of Copleston Church and Community Centre, including Jo Patterson. We sang a rousing Take my Life and pondered Jesus' words in Matthew 28, 16-20 'Go then, to all peoples everywhere...'.

Go... Go where? What does this mean for us? It means going out, going to where people are, to love them and share the Good News of God's love with them. Something for <u>us</u> to consider. We sang Colours of Day which reminds us to 'Go on through the park, on into the town ... the people of darkness are needing a friend'.

Next Russell Furley-Smith as previous Synod Clerk, present Synod Convenor and standing in for the Moderator Bridget Banks (recovering from surgery), wore several hats (literally) to begin the meeting and led the induction of the new Synod Clerk Martin Hayward.

Then came pastoral news. Jacob Bali who has preached at Emmanuel is now at Trinity Wimbledon. A number of ministers have reached milestones, of 40, 50 and 70 years.

We heard about Church Related Community Ministry from Simon Lovett of Brockley and New Cross, and Jo Patterson. It was worth learning about working with people and not *doing* ministry *to* them, building relationships with folk who will continue the work, not just in churches but for everyone. It is important that we are relevant to our community and not asking the community to fit the church. Some examples are responding to the cost of living crisis, partnerships with foodbanks, debt advice, homelessness, mental health, cafes, choirs and building sites.

We split into groups to answer questions:

- What relationships do you have outside the church? Does your community know you are there? Would they care if you were not there?
- How can you improve relationships? What could you do 'not on a Sunday?' Many ideas flowed with the big question Where and what is God asking of you?

Tom Hackett's Youth Report began with thanks expressed for the ministry of Heather Moore as Synod Youth Rep and how she is continuing as Mod Elect, to begin her ministry as Youth Moderator in 2024.

Her successor is Zeerak Shahbaz, a 3rd year psychology student and who gained a lay preaching certificate at age 19. He spoke with great enthusiasm and confidence telling us about his gathering with young Christians from the URC, France and Germany at the International Youth Exchange. He also attended the Synod Residential as a member of the leadership team. We looked at various resolutions from General Assembly that would have implications for local churches, making us move with the times and thinking outwardly.

The increase in Ministry and Mission is necessary and we were reminded this includes salaries, stipends, pensions, training and all other outgoings.

Closing worship included Russell telling how a church in Worthing at the end of WW2 sent shoe boxes to needy people in Germany and how this kindness grew so that churches in the UK, USA, E and W Germany and Czechoslovakia came together. 'Never underestimate a small act of kindness as it can change the world.'

It was a good day and I was inspired by the many people in Southern Synod working together for the Kingdom.

The Temple is near the River Cray where I hoped I might see a kingfisher but did spot a little egret waiting for a tasty fish. Then over the bridge to Hobbycraft to stock up for Messy Church. A day well spent.





Nature ramblings - Christmas robins



My first Christmas card of the season (received in mid-November!) features a robin, and it is a fair bet that robin-themed cards will be winging their way to households across our nation as Christmas approaches. In recent years the robin has been joined on Christmas cards by other avian friends, notably penguins and more recently puffins!

But, I wonder, might a robin have greeted the newborn king in the Bethlehem stable?

There is an ancient tradition that as Mary was giving birth in the cool of night, the warming fire started to die. Then, a brown bird flew down from the rafters and started flapping its wings, fanning the flames back into a blaze. However, in the bird's zeal it went a little too close allowing an ember to scorch its breast red. Mary is said to have smiled and declared that the red breast was a sign of the bird's kind heart which would pass down the generations, for robins to proudly wear.

This legend was built on during Victorian times when the tradition of sending Christmas cards developed, for the Royal Mail posties wore a bright red livery, gaining the nickname, 'robin' or 'robin red-breast'. Before long, robins were depicted on Christmas cards delivering letters and parcels!



So might a robin have attended the birth of Jesus?



Britain has a resident population of robins which is swelled in the winter by robins migrating from colder continental climes for the season. Curiously, robins from Finland tend to head for the Mediterranean in winter, so if Jesus was born in a Bethlehem winter, it is conceivable that a curious robin may have flitted into the stable to greet him.

Overseas charity of the year: The Ideas Partnership

In 2018, the Women's Fellowship, now known as the Fellowship, had a visit from Elizabeth Gowing, a British woman living and working in Kosovo. She told us of a chance encounter with a family living in extreme poverty and insanitary conditions. Their only income was the money the husband made by rifling through discarded rubbish, to find items that could be sold for recycling.

The family of seven lived in a one room shack, where they slept, cooked and ate. Their furniture was one mattress on the floor. One of their sons, a wee toddler, had scars on his legs from pulling a pot of boiling water over himself, and they could not afford the ointment needed for his wounds. Their latrine was outside, and often sewage leaked across their front yard, turning the earth to mud and filth.

These were Ashkali people, marginalised, forgotten, disenfranchised. Their children did not have shoes or decent clothing, so were not able to attend school: they often scoured the rubbish heaps with their fathers, or went out begging but they were malnourished and always hungry. This scene was replicated all over Fushë Kosovë, where minority populations were living.

Elizabeth lobbied the government and the schools to allow these lost children to be educated, and set up a Saturday school to start their education. Along the way, Elizabeth learned more about life in Fushë Kosovë, and the struggles of the Ashkali people. Beginning with individuals, listening to their stories, their hopes and dreams of a better future, she found ways to fund their small enterprises: purchasing stock, renting premises, teaching sales and investment skills, providing bicycles and adult literacy classes for securing jobs.

Fourteen years on, the Ideas Partnership now have four learning centres in Kosovo, more children are in school and some are university graduates. Health outcomes and work opportunities for the population have greatly improved, and environmental projects are underway. Just imagine what more can be achieved when the dreams and aspirations of the citizens of Kosovo are given flight!

Local Charity for Christmas 2023: Bromley Parish Church Homeless Starter Pack Scheme

This is a project set up to collect good quality, household goods and re-distribute them to households moving from homelessness to new tenancies.

Our Local Authority works hard to find homes for homeless people but when someone who has been on the streets or in a hostel gets the keys to their first flat, that's all they get; a bunch of keys, a floor, walls and a roof. That's where the Starter Packs come into it. These people may have been living on the streets; in a hostel; sofa-surfing; escaped domestic violence, or just been released from prison.

Starter Packs provide the basic items needed for making a house or flat into a home. It's a comprehensive package, with bedding, kitchen equipment, toiletries, and cleaning materials. Anne Horner-Tree who runs the scheme, ensures everything included is of good quality, so that the people receiving these packs, feel loved, respected, and dignified.

There is even an eco-aim, to save tonnes of items from going into landfill. All goods donated must be good quality, clean, freshly laundered and free from chips and stains: Anne's team is too small to take on the task of laundering as well.

The benchmark is: Does the item have enough life in it for reuse? How would you feel if given it?

That's not the whole story: some items must be purchased new, such as duvets, pillows, toiletries and cleaning products. Twenty or more packs are required each month, so Anne often tops up the stock from her own pocket when there are insufficient items to complete a pack. Our support will be a massive gift to Anne, and to the people receiving the starter packs.

Eco Hints Round 11: December 2023

A few ideas on how to have a greener Christmas

Make a wreath – perhaps from woodland leaves and berries (source: Natalie Fee, "How to Save the World for Free") or a rag rug version (Greener & Cleaner Bromley have a workshop for this on Friday 8th Dec at 6.30pm)

Rent a Christmas tree ... one that goes back to the nursery after Christmas, gets replanted, and then grows about one foot taller ready for next year

Use biodegradable glitter – one website (peacewiththewild.co.uk) advertises a wide range which is all made from 100% biodegradable, recyclable ingredients and vegan plant products. Just as colourful, just as sparkly, and just as fun.

Learn Furoshiki wrapping techniques – a traditional Japanese way of using large cloths time and again to wrap presents without using sticky tape

Buy seasonal foods – sprouts, carrots, cabbages, leeks, pears and cranberries are all in season from UK farms at this time of year (while those admittedly yummy asparagus tips will have been imported for example). And freeze that extra turkey meat and other leftovers ready for another day.

And if you can, try really hard to avoid plastic ribbon, and also foil-backed or glitter wrapping paper – none of it is recyclable.




