

Míníster's Letter

Mark his words...

Dear Friends,

Whilst many in the world begin their New Year on 1st January, the Church starts around a month earlier on the first Sunday in Advent. The worshipping year then moves to Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter and Pentecost, the longest season which takes us round to the next Advent.

During each season we typically follow a series of themed readings known as the 'lectionary' which over a three-year cycle ensures that we cover a range of readings and subjects – and not just this minister's favourites – I promise! Each of the three years has a lead 'gospel'. As we will be focusing on Mark's Gospel through 2024, I thought that I'd offer a few words to introduce the book.

Mark is widely thought to be the first gospel in two senses. His gospel was the first to be compiled and written, probably around 70 AD, ahead of Matthew's and Luke's gospels (80-90 AD) and the John's gospel (c. 100 AD??). Secondly, Mark's Gospel is the very first 'gospel' as a literary genre.

The word 'gospel' is often translated as 'good news', but familiarity with the word gospel may mean we miss the real 'zing' of its meaning which is a cry of great joy. So what is distinctive about the genre of writing called gospel? It isn't meant as a straight historical account but guides the reader through a series of stories and events which give an insight into not just what Jesus did, but critically, his nature. A gospel might be understood as somewhere between a sermon and a sacrament such that in listening in reading or listening to it being read, we may be drawn to meeting Jesus and experiencing him as near as is possible to the experience of the first disciples.

This introduces one of the features of Mark's gospel – discipleship. Mark portrays discipleship as challenging and sometimes very hard, and records how the disciples often misunderstood Jesus' message and sometimes had hearts hardened against it.

That might ring true to us in our open self-critical reflections. For Mark relates that following Jesus is an all or nothing experience — not much room for those who just want to dip their toes in or be a part-time disciple. If that doesn't put you off, Mark contends that no other decision in life is either more necessary or brings more meaning.

So who is Mark and for whom does he write? There are no certain answers. One insight I read suggested Mark wrote as a minister of one or more likely several congregations, who sought to convey what being a follower of Jesus means against the joys and struggles of 1st century life. There is also an ancient tradition that Mark was a close associate of Jesus' disciple, Peter, and so gained his first-hand accounts of the ministry of Jesus from him. Whichever is right and it might be that both are, Mark wrote around 70AD at a time when many of the first witnesses to Jesus were dying out, so he may have been inspired to set out his gospel to hand on the stories to a new generation before they were lost.

Mark's gospel is the shortest of the gospels, and can be read at a single sitting. That said, one read is seldom enough, for Mark uses a range of literary techniques including irony, allusion, terseness and juxtaposition to make his points, but the following overview of the gospel's structure may help you get started:

Mark 1. 1-15 Beginning

Mark 1. 16 – 8.26 In and around Galilee

Mark 8.22 – 10.52 Travelling from Galilee to Jerusalem

Mark 11.1 – 15.47 Jerusalem Mark 16. 1-8 Ending

Looking forward to February, I plan to offer a weekly Bible study introducing Mark's Gospel as we journey through Lent. This can be online via Zoom as in past years or in person. Please do mention to me if you have an interest in joining in.

I look forward to exploring Mark's gospel with you as we travel in faith in the footsteps of Jesus through the coming year, and may your New Year journey be rich with what is truly important in life and fulfilling in heart.

Nature ramblings - Sexton Beetle

An aspect of my role that has run as a thread through my 30 plus years of service has been the ministry of bereavement. This has variously involved accompanying or people preparing for their own death or guiding them in planning their funeral, helping families shape a service after the death of a loved one, and working with undertakers, who have the role to both put arrangements in place and provide a valued service.

Wind back a 100 or so years and instead of professional undertakers a similar service may have been provided by a combination of a family member or neighbour to lay the person's body out, a carpenter to provide a coffin and a sexton to make many of the church-based arrangements, including digging the grave. It is the ancient role of the sexton that led to the naming of a group of beetles which characteristically seek out bodies, with their service typically offered to small mammals and birds.

Nowadays an undertaker typically hears about a bereavement via a phone call. By contrast, the sexton beetle has antennae with receptors that can detect a corpse many 100s of metres away, and distance depending, can amble along or fly to the body.



On arrival, a male and female sexton beetle will pair up at the scene, mate and bury the body by digging a shallow grave. Eggs are then laid either side of the corpse, so providing a ready food source once the eggs hatch.

As with human undertakers, there is competition, which is resolved in the beetle world by the first arrivals defending the body they claimed. Once the eggs hatch both male and female beetle tend the young, which is atypical of beetles.

Sexton beetles are also attracted by light, so they are sometimes caught in moth traps. When Jan and I stayed with some nature-loving friends in Co. Durham in August we found the sexton beetle shown illustrated in the trap that they had put out overnight.

Whilst I have worked with undertakers professionally through my ministry, in these last weeks I have for the first time called and engaged an undertaker for a loved one from my own family, and greatly appreciated the service that they offer.

I find it fitting that nature also has appointed undertakers, which play a role in the cycle of life and death in the natural world. Isn't creation wonderful.

In Memory - Roger Pickering



Roger who along with his wife Jean joined Emmanuel in 2022, following the closure of the Christ Church URC/Methodist in Ross on Wye, where they belonged, and at a point when they were not easily able to get out and about. They valued continuity of their church membership and joining our services by Zoom.

Roger was born in Hayes Lane, Bromley. His involvement in church stems from his childhood and as a young adult he played a part in Bromley Congregational Church's Young People's Fellowship. It was through the church drama group that he met Jean Appleton, and they were married in July 1957. Jean and Roger were the second couple married in the newly built church (replacing the one destroyed

during the war), following up the aisle in the footsteps of Tony and Janet Kite who were the first couple to wed there, having tied the knot six weeks ahead of them.

Roger went onto serve the church as a Deacon, Church Secretary and Church Treasurer, the latter role he continued to do having joined the local URC following their retirement and move to Ross-on-Wye in 1987.

Roger looked back on his life as being both a long and happy, blessed by much fun and love within his family. Together with Jean they celebrated their silver, ruby, golden, diamond and blue sapphire wedding anniversaries, receiving a congratulatory card from her late majesty, the Queen, for the latter two. He is pictured wearing a diamond patterned tie on their 60th anniversary.

He and Jean had five sons: David, Richard, Andrew, Stephen and Martin, twelve grandchildren and at the time of his death, three great grandchildren, though he knew that a fourth was to arrive imminently. We will miss him dearly, but are thankful for his quiet and typically unassuming ways and consistent love.




