Míníster's Letter

Toleration...

Dear Friends,

There have been a number of recent stories in the news relating to tolerance, or sadly, intolerance. As I write the news is still featuring the alleged language used by a major donor to the Conservative Party, and whilst directed at an individual, it is widely acknowledged as racist, misogynistic and most chillingly, with a seeming incitement to extreme violence. This intolerance is not a one-party issue. As it happens the target of this comment is herself being investigated for inappropriate comments she made about Jewish, Irish and Traveller people.

Broadening the issue out, particularly in the wake of the shocking events of 7th October 2023, both Jewish and Muslim communities in Britain have reportedly experienced an increase of hatred, and with it growing fears for personal well-being.

Into this situation, the Prime Minister has spoken from the steps of Number 10 on extremism and called for the nation to unite to defeat such extremism and hold together our common values, and the Secretary for Levelling Up has announced a new definition of extremism. This was welcomed by some, but sharply criticised by others including the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, with part of their concern being that it risked "vilifying the wrong people" and creating "more division".

I wonder what we may make of what feels like growing intolerance and with it, fear? It is regrettable that some politicians may feel an incentive to create a gap between their position and that of their political opponents, to gain seeming advantage, rather than using language bringing people together. I observe that one person's 'illegal immigrant' is another person's 'vulnerable refugee'.

Sad to say, intolerance, including religious intolerance, is nothing new. Our Reformed Church heritage has been in part shaped by politically-fuelled

intolerance. Back in 1662, a set of repressive laws were introduced restricting the freedom of worship for those who did not follow the then Church of England authorised prayer book, aiming to marginalise our forbears. These laws were not the beginning, but rather built on repression from the 15th and 16th centuries.

Further back, in the late 1580s a group of reformed Christians from the East Midlands fled Britain for the more religiously tolerant and liberal Holland. Their hope was to be able to practice their faith in freedom without threat. Concerned about losing their identity, the group embarked in 1620 on a voyage on the Mayflower. Sailing via Plymouth, they landed in the 'New World' to establish a colony, becoming known as the Pilgrim Fathers.

Though the Pilgrim Fathers sailed as Reformed Christians they sought to import not so much a particular denomination or even Christianity but the spirit of tolerance and religious freedom. The Pilgrims' motivation of risking everything for the freedom to worship according to their conscience, set a precedent that came to be enshrined in the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, guaranteeing the free exercise of religion.

Toleration is part of our denominational heritage. This imperative of toleration also contributed to the ethos of the missionary endeavours of the former London Missionary Society, whose evangelism overseas sought to promote Christianity more than any one denominational expression.

Some 400 years on from the experience of the New World pilgrims, religious and ethnic intolerance is sadly alive and well. Across the world there are nations where Christianity is not tolerated. Whilst the worst excesses of persecution in Britian are thankfully confined to the history, it feels just now that there are growing undercurrents of intolerance in society, not least denigrating or even vilifying those who are seen as 'other' or different'. Whilst such messages are typically associated with political movements, it is so that some churches are not experienced as being genuinely open, tolerant and welcoming as others.

For me the inclusive love of Jesus, who went out of his way to embrace the outcast and marginalised, along with our Reformed tradition of tolerance, can inform and characterise churches to be truly open and welcoming, regardless of an individual's nationality, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, physical abilities, mental

health and capacity or age. Indeed, shaping such an inclusive community may more truly reflect the Kingdom values that Jesus proclaimed.

May tolerance and love bloom in our church and our lives, as the bluebell blooms and fills many a shady glade with new life.

Synod Spring Together Saturday 9thMarch at St Andrew's URC Cheam

Marion Bayley from Elmers End and I went to Synod with our minister David who kindly drove us to Cheam URC. It was good to meet up with people who have had connections with Emmanuel, Elizabeth Richmond, Russell Furley-Smith, Jenny Sheehan and Bea Pollard, and to see our Moderator Revd Bridget Banks in better health.

Revd Nadene Snyman led our opening worship focussing on a photo of a robin's nest with a tiny hatchling in her garden waste bin, a surprising place for life to begin. Jesus calls us to new life even when and where it seems rubbish and hurts, and to new life in our churches.

During the morning we heard an inspiring presentation from Revd Ashley Evans, Yorkshire Synod Evangelist. Jesus talks all the time about growth and tells us to go and make disciples. We have the best message, God loves you, your family, your friends.

Growth should be central to being church. The Good News is the same, how we tell it changes. We need touching points, to find out about people and ask 'Have you ever thought about God?' perhaps over a meal, making it easy for people to come in, remembering we are the Priesthood of all Believers. At lunch I met a lady who was asking about Messy Church. She is a convert from Islam and had a fascinating story that had been shown on television.

We next considered the nomination for Moderator of General Assembly 2025-2026. Some of you may know of Revd Neil Thorogood, son of missionary Bernard, ordained in 1992, latterly Principal of Westminster College. Neil is an artist and you may have noticed one of his bright paintings in the vestry. The vote was unanimous.

During Pastoralia we heard of the recent death of Revd David Marshall-Jones OBE, former National Scout Chaplain. We then heard about a project in a new housing estate and the town centre, plus one where counselling in mental health has made an impact.

Regarding finance John Denison said the Synod cash balance is good (from the sale of buildings) and some of this has gone to the Ministers' Pension Fund. Our M&M contributions are the 'life blood' of the URC.

He also spoke of the Strategic Mission fund for future outreach programmes and Revd Keith Morrison enlarged on this. He quoted Joel 2:28 '*I will pour out my Spirit on everyone: your sons and daughters will proclaim my message; your old men will have dreams and your young men will see visions' GNB.* The Holy Spirit inspires the Kingdom to grow.

Revd Roger Jones spoke of a grant given to a young person at Tolworth URC for a few hours a week. She helps with Junior Church, Pilots, Messy Church and social media, gets alongside young people and there is a buzz in the church. Over 2 years they have given her responsibility, she has grown and developed and it has been good for her and the whole church.

We saw a film of young people speaking of their faith at the Limitless Youth Festival in Staffordshire, who appreciated the money from this fund that allowed them to go.

Next came the Synod Children's and Youth Work report. Heather's successor Zeerak Shahbaz thanked everyone for their support and encouragement and said that it had been a privilege to receive his lay preaching certificate. Youth Assembly had been a good mix of business, resolutions and activities with some attending for the first time, including Zeerak himself. Of course Youth assembly is where Heather Moore was inducted into the role of Youth Moderator and we saw some pictures of the event. Emmanuel have already seen some photos, thanks to Marion and Ian. Synod Together expressed their support for Heather.

Tom Hackett, Children and Youth Development Officer, told us of future events and some resources and gave Emmanuel packs of prayer prompt cards. He was pleased to hear about our Children and Family Worker Julie Cook and the difference she is making at Emmanuel.

We closed with worship reflecting on the image that Nadene had given to us of the robin's nest, with new life and growth beginning in unexpected places.

Nature ramblings – Sounds of Nature

The hymn, How great thou art, includes a verse which opens... When through the woods and forest glades I wander And hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees;

Through March Jan and I enjoyed a wander or two in Spring Park Woods, in the winter quiet, to paraphrase Paul Simon and Art Garfunkel, 'The Sound of Silence', (the screech of parakeets excepted) gave way to Spring's awakening.



Our March walks were accompanied by the guttural craw of the crow, the lighter zee zee zeeing of tits nimbly picking their way through tasty morsels in upper branches, the cheery whistle of the robin, one of the few birds that we spotted, with head held jaunty, and unseen but heard from afar, woodpeckers.

Britain is home to three species of woodpeckers. The largest being the pigeon-sized green woodpecker, which whilst woodland-nesting, is often seen in open grassy areas, rooting around for ants

and other delights. From time to time we've seen them on the manse lawn. They also climb trunks and navigate branches with aplomb, seeking out bugs and beasties. Olive green in colour, they are crowned in red with black around the face. The sexes may be distinguished, with the male sporting a red moustache-like colouration.

The mid-sized woodpecker on the woodland block is the Greater Spotted Woodpecker. Starling-proportioned, they have increased numerically in recent decades, and are now the most numerous of the three species. Colour-wise they are black and white, sporting red under the tail and for the male, a red crown.

The smallest of the trio is the lesser spotted woodpecker, its name reflecting its diminutive sparrow-like size. Sad to say, its population has steeply declined leaving the species restricted to a few woods, mainly in the southern half of England.

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Whilst we didn't spot a woodpecker on our woodland walks (so no photo to share), we heard the distinctive drumming of the greater spotted. Its headbanging, short staccato bursts echo through woods in Spring, communicating to attract mates and stake out territories. Then, joy of joy, our ears caught the distinctive yaffle cry, akin to a shrieking laugh of the green woodpecker. Like God, the two species of woodpecker were unseen but discernibly present, and thus our hearts could echo the chorus,

Then sings my soul, my Saviour God to thee, how great thou art, how great thou art!

May you enjoy Spring's audible delights, perhaps less 'Sounds of Silence' and more, as Lou Reed (nearly) sang, 'a walk on the wood side', David

PS I saw my first identifiable butterfly of the season, a peacock, on 20th March. I hope that my species count may grow in the coming months, and will keep you informed.

Personal Thanks & Announcements

his month Emmanuel has received two thank you letters in response to charitable fund raising, shown on the next two pages.

The first thank you letter is from the Ideas Partnership, our 2024 overseas charity, which received 50% of the donations given to our 2024 Christmas Appeal. From this a cheque for an amazing £900 was presented to Elizabeth Gowing from The Ideas Partnership during our morning service on Sunday 25th February. On that occasion Elizabeth gave us an inspiring presentation on the charity's work. The proceeds of our Summer Fair, planned for Sunday 7th July 2024, will also go to The Ideas Partnership.

The second thank you letter is from The Vine Food Bank, New Addington, following our latest donation of £2000. This comes from donations given at our Warm Welcome Fridays @ Emmanuel Venture. This gift follows one of the same amount last April, so to date Warm Welcome has raised a vital £4000 for the Food Bank.

And an update. Last month I reported that I wrote to Beckenham's MP, Bob Stewart, associating myself with a letter from Bromley's Three Faiths' Group, which brings together Jews, Christians and Muslims, and requested a response. The letter, which was published in March's edition of Emmanuel Life, asked that he used his position and influence to advocate for:

- Full and immediate access for humanitarian aid to all parts of Gaza
- Immediate and permanent bilateral ceasefire (that is, cessation of all hostilities once and for all)
- Release of all hostages
- Protection of Palestinians (and Israeli peace activists) in the West Bank
- Sustained efforts to end the longstanding huge injustices against Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank

I promised that I would share any response received. I am sorry to report that I haven't received a response from our MP, despite sending a reminder to him a week prior to the deadline for this edition of Emmanuel Life. Should I hear in the future, I will let you know.

Meanwhile, along with churches and those of other faiths, we continue to pray for peace, pray for Shalom in Gaza and across the land we call Holy.

february march

Friends,

Safe to say my first two months in post have been rather busy! Although last month I only wrote about Youth Assembly, at the time of writing we had also already had Assembly Executive! This is a smaller version of General Assembly which meets to discuss the work of General Assembly and pass some resolutions. A big part of the meeting for me was the ongoing discussion of the formation of a formal ministry of children's and youth work, which is being led by Children and Youth Work Committee (CYWC). I find this really exciting, as not only does it affirm the importance of children's and youth work (a fun stat is that 83% of people come to faith before the age of 25), but it also shows our intention to make those whose calling it is to work with children and young people more valued and equipped in their call and ministry.

At the beginning of March we had the first Youth Exec meeting of the year, all the way down in Cardiff (a very long way from Durham!). It was so exciting to meet for the first time as a group, and get to know some new people alongside connecting again with my friends. Also, the group is getting younger, which is brilliant as it reflects the changing demographics of Youth Assembly. We discussed the feedback and resolutions from Youth Assembly, did some dreaming about next years event, got to chat to John Bradbury the General Secretary and attended a local church on Sunday morning. Alongside all of this we had plenty of time to have fun together and bond as a group, and I can't wait to see what everyone achieves this year.

Finally for residential meetings, I am currently at CYWC in Leeds! Again we are discussing the resolution from Assembly Executive, and the proposal that will be going to General Assembly, but its also great to hear about the work, resources and stories from children and youth work across the denomination.

Alongside these residentials, I am still meeting with Sam, the head of children's and youth work, and have also got involved in a group discussing all things Israel and Palestine, including working together on some General Assembly motions so we can present and carry out some strong and meaningful work together.


Scouting is getting stronger at Emmanuel
