SYNOD SPRING TOGETHER SATURDAY 8THMARCH AT EAST CROYDON URC THEME- WELCOME TO THE TEAM

A quick Superloop bus ride took Ian Moore and me to East Croydon where I saw Bryn and a few others I recognised. Revd Russell Furley-Smith presided, as our Moderator Revd Bridget Banks was unwell, declaring Synod open 'in the name of Jesus Christ, whose we are and whom we serve'.

Revd Memona Shahbaz led our opening worship, reminding us of the theme being the TEAM. In John chapter 13, Jesus asks his disciples if they understand the meaning of service and Luke 10 verses 1 and 2 remind us that Jesus sent out 70 followers in pairs. On International Women's Day Memona told us how joyful she is to serve God in the Eastbourne churches as in her home country of Pakistan she would not be allowed to. She showed us pictures of how the Eastbourne churches are serving the local community in the hospital, with the police, in shops and stations and with the WI.

Various matters were dealt with in the business section, with the resourcing of Theological Training needing the most attention. The Fund for ministerial and other training has until now been paid for from the M&M (Ministry and Mission) Fund which can no longer pay for all it used to do. One response might be to reduce training but we need to train new ministers, Church Related Community Workers, Lay Preachers and more.

There are growing funds from church closures which could be used to fund sustainable theological training in the URC. John Ellis explained this well and a number of people expressed how vital their training had been, both at the beginning and during their ministry. The mind of Synod was tested and we recommended that provision of theological training is essential and that any review should focus on funding models that provide long term sustainability with wealth from beyond the M&M.

A 5 minute break took us to the next section – Working Together to Build the Kingdom. Ian Moore was introduced as the new Green Apostle for Southern Synod and he was delighted to unveil the framed certificate for the Bronze Eco Synod Award, largely built on the work of previous Green Apostles, Revds David Pickering, Nadene Snyman and Alex Mabbs.

Mark Rigby's presentation on training for elders explained how eldership has both legal requirements and a strong biblical basis. I partook of Mark's training on the previous Saturday and found it very helpful.

Next Russell inducted 2 people into important roles in the Synod. Some of you will remember Jo Patterson who came to Emmanuel in 2022 to help us 'think outside the box'. Jo was inducted into her new role as Mission and Discipleship Officer and we also welcomed Revd Charisa Hunter Crump from the USA as Training and Development Officer.

In our closing worship Russell reminded us that the world is full of good people who will reach out to those in need. God is there. Do not despair. The power of love is greater than the world's power.

Remember, we are The TEAM.

There is kerbside parking next to the church in Hilldown Road and Courtlands Avenue, and in Crest Road 100 yards up the hill. Step-free access from Pickhurst Lane.

Good Friday at 11am at St Francis: the Churches Together in West Wickham will each have people who will be participating, including Emmanuel. Annually a well-attended service.

On **Easter Day** Marion will be leading our worship. She has written in greater detail about our Easter celebration below – have a look!

News of the Church Family, URC and wider Church Community

Shrove Tuesday pancakes seem long past now, but we still have the thoughtfulness of Lent with us – inevitably, also, as the international situation seems to remain dire in many respects. The UK has slipped in its happiness rating, apparently. Yet we live in a country that is wealthy compared to many others, and has ideals around personal freedom, health opportunities and the rule of law that others envy. As a Radio 4 listener, I wonder about the guarrelsome contentiousness of the Today programme presenters, and news on the hour every hour – and what that does to our thinking. We forget that events that make the news are exceptions: the 1% that is negative; while 99% is positive and works as well as we might hope.

In church terms, we approach the downward spiral of Holy Week to Good Friday – so, superficially, not much help there, then... The amazing thing is that the early followers of Jesus began to understand the disaster of the crucifixion as a positive event - both in itself and, of course, because of the way the Resurrection Christ appeared to them. As, I hope, we are beginning to see. Luke is foremost among the positive thinkers.

It is not easy in everyday life to achieve a 3-day transformation from sorrow to gladness, from a scary diagnosis to competent coping; but that is the process that we celebrate at Easter, however long it may take us to get there in reality.

There is good news among our fellowship, too.

A Rocha UK's Easy Eco Tips

Luke's approach to the last hours in the life of Jesus

Each month we are following Luke's Gospel (and later his Acts of the Apostles) to see how he deals with the big ideas that we consider at Christmas (Epiphany), Good Friday, Easter and Pentecost. With others to mark David's retirement and Trinity, that covers six months.

Luke's insights were shown, as we have seen, by his emphasis on the aspect of Jesus' ministry that favoured poor people. Around the Birth, he featured shepherds (with angels bringing God's message *to them!*), the manger and the Magnificat manifesto. Later Luke's Beatitudes mention not 'poor in spirit' (Matthew) but plain 'poor'.

When we turn to the Passion story (chapters 22 and 23) Luke's choices (compared with Mark) are just as striking. Here are some of them:

In Gethsemane the disciples go to sleep. You might expect them to be supportive and extra vigilant, but that is not the case: Mark shows Jesus feeling badly let down as they go to sleep *three times*. Luke ignores much of that, as he does not want to show the disciples as uncaring, nor Jesus as being impatient with them. He shows them asleep only once and sympathetically explains it away with 'because of their grief'.

So Luke deletes material from his copy of Mark's gospel something he cannot accept. He can also *add* an interesting episode, e.g. with Pilate sharing the problem of possible crucifixion with Herod Antipas, 'as he was in Jerusalem', noting that after that 'they became firm friends'.

All four gospels say that a slave's ear was injured by one of Jesus' people. (John says it was Peter and that the slave's name was Malchus.) Only Dr Luke has the insight to consider what Jesus did next, telling us that he healed the ear – an event that in Luke's mind is a prime example of Jesus' wonderful healing ministry.

Only Luke tells us what Jesus says as they nail him to the cross, 'Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do'. Then we hear that the penitent thief recognises that, while both thieves deserved their punishment, Jesus had done nothing to merit being crucified. Jesus' response was, 'Today you will be with me in Paradise'. Only Luke...

The most starkly different point is that, while Mark gives Jesus' last words as 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' Luke substitutes, 'Into your hands I commit my spirit'. Luke just cannot believe that Jesus would have felt abandoned, so he sets aside the text of Mark that he has in front of him, and offers a serene final thought instead. Then Luke worked out that a Roman officer was unlikely to use the phrase 'Truly, this man was the Son of God', so he changes it to, 'This man was innocent'.

What do we make of these differences? Enlightening, I hope. Luke is a profound thinker in his own right, as well as a convinced and faithful follower of Jesus: he doesn't just pass on as facts information he has researched about the happenings of 50-60 years before, but reflects on them in the light of his commitment to Jesus in his own life.

So we too can reflect on our experience of our faith: as with Luke, that process is an aspect of what we mean by the work of the Holy Spirit. We will come up with something that is broadly in line with what the Bible says, but, for each one of us, it will be subtly different.

Further, however we understood the 'inspired Word of God' in the past, we can now see that the Holy Spirit acts *through* Luke and the three others to produce accounts that give authentically their knowledge of their Lord, each being slightly – but significantly – different from each other, all of them being wonderful windows into the life of Jesus. Read Luke 22 and 23 and don't be surprised if eyes moisten up.

Good Friday

Good Friday is on 18th April.






