## Pastoral Letter

### Dear Friends,



It is unusual for a pastoral letter in the United Reformed Church to focus on a Pope. In past centuries devoted people have killed and been killed for being on the 'wrong' side of the Protestant/Catholic divide. But things have changed – and we thank God for that.

### **Pope Francis**

Jorge Bergoglio was a great man – we have known him as Pope Francis. While I think of myself as a convinced Protestant, I also understand that the boundaries between various versions of

Christianity have become unimportant in many respects, especially in the way our Christian faith relates to the rest of the world. We need a strong leader as we face issues between competing political and economic systems, and in our relationship with other faiths. Pope Francis provided that sort of leadership.

The United Reformed Church has provided an excellent reflection about Pope Francis, which you can download here:

The reflection begins as follows:

The United Reformed Church, with Christians everywhere, mourns the death of His Holiness Pope Francis, and extends its sympathy to Catholics who will grieve this loss most keenly.

Jorge Mario Bergoglio was elected Pope in March 2013 taking office after the abdication of Benedict XVI. It is rumoured Bergoglio was the runner up when Benedict was elected and was the first Pope ever to have his predecessor living in such proximity throughout much of his papal ministry.

All who are called to offices of leadership and oversight in the Church realise how demanding these roles can be; none is more demanding than that of Bishop of Rome. The complexity of the task tired Benedict to the point of exhaustion and the toll of the office was heavy for Francis.

Within the limitations and expectations of the Papal office Francis was an agent of change who sat lightly on inherited traditions and pomp. Rejecting an ermine lined red cape before being presented to the crowds in St Peter's, Francis said to an aide "no thank you Monsignor ... the carnival is over!".

Living a simple lifestyle meant, for Francis, rejecting a move into the Papal apartments (which he said had room for more than 300 people) and remaining in a small suite in the Vatican guesthouse, taking his meals with other guests.

Francis saw his ministry, primarily, as being one who called the Church to be missionary. He wanted every element of the Church's life to reflect missionary discipleship and the building of the Kingdom.

From our Reformed point of view, Catholic thinking has a huge weight of tradition to overcome, particularly over the ordination of women, which has existed in the Congregational side of our heritage since 1917. There was more than a touch of reforming in the papal ministry of Francis. We can admire so much of what Pope Francis set out to achieve. We thank God for all that he was as a man of God.

I write to extend to you and your congregation at St Mark's our condolences following the death of Pope Francis. There were all sorts of things that made him a leader not just of the Catholic Church but of the church universal in its widest sense. Maybe simply his choice of papal name, maybe his preference for simplicity in everyday living, maybe his ease of relating to all sorts of people. From our Reformed point of view, we appreciated his reviving of aspects of synodical advice and governance. Perhaps he simply communicated God's love in a special way.

In your sadness, celebrate his greatness, and know that others, outside your main tradition, are doing so, too.

This is a charity recommended by our Warm Welcome Fridays chef Tania and is in her home town of Lviv in Ukraine.

**Oberig** means 'Guardian, angel on the shoulder'.

It is a non-profit charity providing support to Ukrainians impacted by the war.

A large mansion has been donated as a school for children displaced from their community.

There are 120 special needs children, age 6 to 18, a number of whom are non-verbal. We at Emmanuel can play our part by raising money for electronic tablets that can be programmed to enable non-verbal students to communicate.



Half of our Christmas Day collection has already purchased tablets which have been sent to the school. On **Sunday 1**<sup>st</sup> **June we will hold our Summer Fair** and all the proceeds will be for Oberig. Do put the date in your diary so that we can give these children our best support.

## Commitment for Life met up with Sostina Takure, who coordinates the Zimbabwe ACT Alliance Forum.



Sostina told us about just how much she loves working with the ACT (Action by Churches Together) Alliance. ACT Alliance is faith based and, as a pastor's wife, Sostina feels right at home. She coordinates the efforts

to assist people who are most at risk in Zimbabwe.

When Hurricane Idai struck Zimbabwe several years ago, Christian Aid in collaboration with ACT Alliance, was one of the first to have 'boots on the ground'. They helped people to safety, rescued personal property and livestock and helped people rebuild over 500 houses.

Sostina told us how she is passionate about empowering women, whether this is in relation to economics or to family life. She helps women set up markets that empower them to get good prices for their produce. Sometimes, women need help to get out of abusive situations. Sostina is there to help, with the assistance of the church.

With your continued support for Commitment for Life, incredible people like Sostina can function and do what they do best – care for people. Please continue in your prayers for Zimbabwe, especially given how attention is being diverted by local and global crises.

## Just a thought...

### How Luke's Gospel deals with Resurrection

We have seen how Luke writes about the Birth of Christ and then about his last hours. Now we look at the way he presents Resurrection. So far, we have noted his emphasis on the importance of poor people in Jesus' ministry, and the way he changes Mark's account, e.g. to be kind to the disciples and to underline Jesus' compassion (healing the slave's ear, reassuring the repentant thief) and his last words on the cross.

Now that we come to Resurrection he makes us think hard about Jesus' Resurrection body by including aspects that seen incompatible to us.

Reading between the lines, we can see he is sympathetic to the women who came with embalming spices, devotedly wanting to carry out their duty later than they wished (because of the intervening sabbath) and finding an empty tomb, thus preventing them from expressing their respect and love for Jesus ('...it was the least we could do...'). And then they were disrespected by the male disciples, who did not believe their report that the tomb was empty ('We can't believe women'). Peter (give him is due?) goes alone to confirm this as a fact, whereas in John's gospel he and John have a boys-will-be-boys race to get there first.

Then we read a major part of the story, which, like the shepherds, the manger, the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son, is found only in Luke: the walk to Emmaus. It has rightly become a favourite in the devotional life of many Christians: two people set off on a journey; a stranger joins them; they do not recognise him as Jesus, who explains scriptures for them; they arrive and invite the stranger to join them (as in the hymn 'Abide with me, fast falls the eventide'): they sit down at table, the stranger says grace, blessing the bread just as in the Last Supper; finally they recognise Jesus; at that moment he vanishes. Our reflection is that we can always rely on God, even if we do not recognise his presence, and even if he suddenly seems to leave us. Our Good Friday moment of sorrow can become an unexpected Easter time of joy. Somehow he takes charge, blessing us and actions we take in his name. The non-recognition and the sudden vanishing become, not puzzling weaknesses, but the strengths of the story. If, however, we try to use this story to explain what Jesus' body was like, we get nowhere: Jesus can walk and talk, yet is not recognisable? He prepares to eat, yet vanishes into thin air? We can't work it out.

The next part of the story is also puzzling: Jesus appears among them and they think they are seeing a ghost. 'I'm no ghost,' says Jesus, in effect. He eats some fish that they offer him (a detail that suits Galilee better than Jerusalem). So, a real body just as before the Crucifixion?

Mark's gospel says he will meet his followers in Galilee; Matthew ends his book with Jesus giving the Great Commission in Galilee; John sets the scene in Jerusalem in ch20, then takes them off to Galilee in ch21. Why does Luke insist that they stay in Jerusalem? Because in seven weeks' time he needs them to be there to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The scholars have not conclusively worked out why Mark and Matthew want him back in Galilee: the gospels do not say...

Luke, meticulous historian, diligent researcher and organised editor, gives us stories he thinks are significant. His deep faith in Jesus may make him unaware of the contradictory aspects of some of his account; or, of course, 2000 years ago, humanity had not yet developed the scientific, factual, approach we now take for granted. What IS clear is that Jesus appeared to many people – Paul in 1 Corinthians 15 says 50. Maybe it does not matter what *exactly* his body, or 'body', or vision of body, was like. Our Scriptures provide testimony, not explanation. We intuitively know that Jesus appears to us also in ways appropriate to us.

Asking us to see Christ in others, and to try to be Christ to others? Everywhere, every day, involving everyone?

## AN UNUSUAL SCHOOL OUTING

Flora suggested that I might try writing an article about life in our amazing world.

In 1977 I was teaching in Brunei Borneo and our family moved into a new bungalow on a hill and I remember getting out a map and looking out of the window and realized that the tropical rain forest in front of me went on for hundreds of miles without a break. Unfortunately today man has cleared large areas of that forest and planted palm oil plantations.

My friend Ralph was teaching Geography and as he had a friend working for World Wide Helicopters he suggested that we took ten Malay boys and girls on a three nights away camping trip to a forest area called Temburong. We would disembark from the helicopter on a hill called Bukit Pagon at a height of 1,870 metres. The Brunei Army lent us 25 "Bashers". These are rectangular waterproof canvas sheets with a seam up each side so you can push poles through them and make beds and also join them up to make a crude shelter.

We also took water containers, parang machetes (to cut poles and firewood) and general camping gear. After disembarking with our gear Ralph groaned and I asked him what the matter was. He said "The pilot has left us on the wrong hill and I hope that he realizes that when he returns to pick us up as we have no means of communicating with the outside world". Then we immediately picked up our parangs and set about cutting poles to fix up our beds and make some kind of roof over our heads on the helicopter landing patch. After that we cut firewood and fetched water from a stream we found at the bottom of the hill. After making a fire and boiling some water we had a well earned mug of tea.

We had a wonderful view from the hill over primeval forest and we were woken in the morning by the howling of gibbons from below. Their howls seemed to echo for miles.

In the short time there we explored the forest using animal tracks, though we didn't see any and no tribal people seemed to live in that area. Insects and bugs abounded and the vegetation was profuse and varied and pitcher plants were abundant. Trekking through the forest, keeping the cooking fire going, fetching water and preparing meals made the time go quickly. The school students were pleasant company and we soon got to know something of one another and they enjoyed the chance of boy/girl sociability as this is often difficult in a Muslim community. We were all obliged to learn to share, be tolerant, considerate and cooperate in a confined space.

When we awoke on Sunday it was raining and very misty. We dismantled our camp and waited for the arrival of the helicopter. At about 10.00am we heard the rotor blades of the helicopter, but after a time the noise faded away. We decided to put up the canvas sheets again to give us and our kit some protection from the rain and we would just wait it out.

The parents of the children who had come to the army camp to collect their children put pressure on the helicopter pilot to come out again, which he did a few hours later and this time he realized which hill he had left us on. At about 4.00pm we heard the helicopter and then saw it coming out of the mist. We quickly dismantled our shelter and threw everything into the helicopter and scrambled in after it. I asked one of the boys how he had enjoyed the outing. "These have been the most exciting days of my life" he replied.

# Memory Box is celebrating its **9**<sup>th</sup> Birthday

Memory Box Dementia Café was started in 2016 by some members of Ravenswood (West Wickham) WI. This was our community contribution to celebrate the WI Centenary of 2015 as we were aware there was no other provision for people living with dementia in West Wickham. Our aim remains to make West Wickham dementia friendly.

We first met in the Hewitt room with a few people meeting once a month, soon moved to Griffiths Jones and also started meeting twice a month. We have been in the Richmond hall for some years now in order to accommodate all our visitors and volunteers.

Visitors come to us from Bromley, Croydon and even further away. While we work within our community we are there to support anyone living with dementia and their carer(s) as we know how little care is available. While volunteers were initially from Ravenswood and other local Wis, we soon recruited through Churches Together. Now we have an even wider group of volunteers from the community in general. We hope to recruit to our steering group as there are few of us to be able to keep up momentum.

A number of volunteers have been with us from the beginning. They are a great group of people committed to helping those living with dementia. We organise yearly training sessions for volunteers and our baseline is attending a Dementia Friends session.

We hold the café on 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Fridays 2pm-3.30pm (sometimes 4pm) and thanks to a bid to Bromley Innovation Fund we were able to set up Move with Memory Box with an instructor from Primetime on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Fridays with Emmanuel's Warm Welcome providing visitors with refreshments after their exercise session. We are the only dementia specific exercise class in Bromley although there are dementia friendly classes provided by Primetime.

Thanks to the agreement of the then Minister David Pickering and the Elders Emmanuel provides a dementia friendly service when there is a 5<sup>th</sup> Friday in the month, followed by refreshments again kindly provided by Warm Welcome enabling everyone to mix and get to know each other.

Emmanuel is ideal as a venue for Memory Box. We share the desire to embrace the local community, do not judge and do not turn anyone with dementia away. Memory Box Dementia Café can have upwards of 8 tables of 6 visitors, each table supported by a volunteer. Refreshments are a highlight, especially chocolate biscuits! We are very grateful for the assistance offered in preparing the room so that tables and chairs are available for our visitors. At the café we provide a variety of entertainment, craft activities, quizzes, word searches, crosswords, colouring, song and dance. Music is so important in the lives of those living with dementia, helping them to continue to communicate in whatever way they can.

Memory Box are grateful to Ravenswood WI for our start and we are now independent. Our funding for the café is through fund raising, donations and generous bequests. We are pleased to be partners with Bromley Dementia Friendly Communities, the umbrella organisation for dementia in Bromley. Our chair, Lyn is leading on a transport project with BDFC as we are aware many cannot get to dementia cafés as public transport may be too difficult or there is increasing need for more appropriate transport. This is an exciting and challenging project.

We will keep going, saddened when people leave us but always pleased to see new visitors join the existing group. Some former carers return on a regular basis feeling a part of Memory Box family. We are Grateful for our "home" at Emmanuel and while Memory Box is non religious and non political, between us we are enhancing the lives of people living with dementia and their carers. It is a joy to see the smiling faces arriving at Memory Box and to hear how people enjoy coming. It is a privilege to be able to be part of people's lives. Emmanuel and Memory Box Dementia Café is definitely the "go-to" place in West Wickham on a Friday afternoon!

## TWO SPECIAL MEMORIES

In 2002 Sam and I had a wonderful holiday in New Zealand and spent four weeks with friends touring around the North and South Islands.

We stayed for three nights on a farm in Fox Glacier, on the west coast of the South Island and booked ourselves on to a trip by helicopter to take us to the snow fields on the very top of Fox Glacier.

The helicopter took just the four of us and it was amazing flying up over the glacier and then landing on the snow fields beyond. The sky was so blue and it was surprisingly warm, wispy clouds were so low, or perhaps it was because we were so high up, we felt we could touch them.

It is hard to describe just how fantastic it felt up there on the snow fields, as apart from our pilot and the helicopter, we were the only people on this huge expanse of snow stretching as far as the eye could see and the top of the glacier clearly visible. After we had indulged in a snow fight, we marvelled at the sheer beauty of the landscape, it really brought home to us just how powerful nature can be — it took our breath away and that incredible experience is still fresh in our minds after 23 years.

Fast forward to 2020, this time of year, end of April, the country was in lockdown and the weather was glorious. We went out every morning after breakfast for our permitted daily walk and discovered areas around West Wickham that we didn't know existed!

One day we decided to do a walk that we knew very well – across the fields to St John's Church on the hill as we hadn't done that walk for a few months. It was a joy to cross the road from Sparrow's Den without having to dodge the traffic and we headed off, through the woods first before crossing the fields.

As we came to the last field that leads up to the church we just stopped walking, we hadn't said a word but we were both overwhelmed by the sight that greeted us. To the left of the narrow footpath the field was a mass of yellow rape seed and to the right there was a multitude of bright red poppies. The church straight ahead standing on the hill, was bathed in sunshine against a backdrop of the bluest of skies and all around us the trees were sporting that beautiful shade of green that comes with the spring growth. It was breath taking, but what really struck us was the lack of noise apart from the most wonderful birdsong. No cars and lorries pounding up and down the mad mile, no aeroplanes and not another living soul in sight. Just peace, birdsong and undiluted nature at its best.

These two very different, amazing and frankly, biblical moments had a huge impact on us and we feel blessed to have experienced them.

## "No Mow May" is here again

Time to rein back on the lawnmower, and celebrate having a diverse garden.

At Emmanuel, for a couple of years we've been setting aside parts of our grassy areas for longer grass over summer. We keep some parts short, and others long, all part of trying to create a diverse habitat which is:

- better for all the microbes and so on in the soil
- better for more flowers with the nectar which help bumblebees, moths and butterflies.

Dandelions are a particularly good source of nectar as they come into flower early and and provide much needed food early in the season when there is little else out in flower.

So if you see stripes that don't look mown in the coming months, those could well be the deliberately unmown bits. And if you see lots of colours in there, then it means we're winning in getting more biodiversity.






