Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

Summery sun but cool breezes... The longest dry spell for ages, yet 'ne'er cast a clout ere May is out!' Sometimes (usually in the UK?!) the weather echoes our feelings about life with all its variety of blessings and challenges.

Harold Macmillan, when asked about his greatest challenge, said 'Events, dear boy, events'. But that is only the framework. Life is so much more than 'events'. The classic statement is that our sole purpose is to glorify God. Yes, of course. But how can we break that thought down in everyday terms, to enable us to do that? How about the ways we react and respond: all the feelings and thoughts, regrets and hopes, failures, successes and ideals?

Getting our bearings right about all that... is what church is about. It may come in a precise way in a Bible reading, a prayer, a sermon or something someone says over coffee. Or in a more general way, as we sense that this is a good place where we belong, where we can trust people and feel friendship, where we can feel uplifted in music, where we can enjoy the environment, where we care and share, where understanding and empathy abound.

I like trying to explain things, especially from the Bible. But in everyday life It's not so much about a theology of the cross, as a feeling of being freed as followers of Jesus; less a detail about a resurrected body, as celebrating that goodness and love win through; less the wind and flame, as the Spirit being expressed in what we think, feel and do. Just being with each other is a big part of that. That applies to us at Emmanuel and also to our fellowship with other churches in West Wickham.


Perhaps you will feel led to respond to this suggestion: that on Sunday 8th June we gather together at Pentecost – Whitsun if you prefer – in the morning at 10.30 as usual, but also for **Tea on the Green at 5.15 for a service at 6pm that we are hosting for Churches Together in West Wickham**. It's Holy Spirit Day – the Church's Birthday – celebration time. (Indoors, of course, if it is too cold or wet...)

"LAUDATO SI"



This month, following the news of the death of Pope Francis, I've been reading "Laudato Si", his encyclical from May 2015.

Many of you will know of Laudato Si, some of you may have read the encyclical itself. I admit it's not a quick read - 80 odd pages - but I do recommend it. It's still readily available on the Vatican's website of course. There are many, many sections that I could happily pull out as quotes. There is deep theology, rooted in Catholicism of course, but much that is universal I would suggest. Indeed, there is a deliberate appeal to all.

Of course, Pope Francis took his name in homage to St Francis of Assisi, sometimes called the patron saint of ecology. The encyclical reminds us that St Francis was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. And so throughout the encyclical there is a repeated, heavily interwoven message that

"a true ecological approach always becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor." (para 49)

Laudato Si is not just a lament, it's not just a treatise, and it's not just for Christians. Pope Francis addresses it to every living person on the planet. For me it serves as yet another reminder that we must use the message of caring for God's creation to help frame all our conversations with our neighbours, those of Christian faith, of other faiths or of none.

PS "Laudato Si" is also now the name of the umbrella Catholic movement covering over 1,000 organisations worldwide committed to caring for the common home that is earth.

Why 'Leo'?

Popes take on a new name on election: Cardinal Robert Prevost was no exception. So why choose the name 'Leo'?

It's not that he wants to roar like a lion ('leo' in Latin). He sees himself as treading in the footsteps of Leo XIII (1810–1903), Pope from 1878 to 1903, whose dates are comparable to Queen Victoria's (1819 – 1901).

Leo XIII defined the position of the Catholic Church with regard to modern thinking. In his 1891 encyclical Rerum novarum ('Of New Things'), he outlined the rights of workers to a fair wage, safe working conditions and the formation of trade unions, while affirming the rights to property and free enterprise, opposing both socialism and laissez-faire capitalism. He became known as the 'Social Pope', having created the foundations for modern thinking in the social doctrines of the Catholic Church, influencing his successors.

That Leo was Pope during a time of social change in the last quarter of the 19th century. The new Pope Leo is aware of major changes in the world, like AI and the diminishing role of democracy. Given such social, political and economic change, he hopes to lead the Catholic Church in asserting Christian values in a powerful way, especially to promote peace.

I may write about popes, but no, I am not an under-cover catholic! There is much in catholic belief that a URC minister could not hold, but locally we get on very well and engage in the same sort of love-your-neighbour Christianity that really matters in our community. I think that is more important than doctrine. Also, our world needs strong Christian leadership to challenge both European secularism and influences from China, Russia and America.

Our Reformed tradition is not hierarchical, so we do not bring to prominence any particular leader, recognised world-wide as a person of significance. This Pope – Leo XIV – could provide the leadership that Christianity needs just now. We may well find that he speaks for us as well as for his own Church.

A THOUGHT FOR THIS YEAR WITH CELEBRATING EIGHTY YEARS SINCE WORLD WAR TWO WITH VICTORY OVER NAZI GERMANY

My twin brother George like me was a school teacher. We sometimes discussed our reactions to various situations which we encountered at our schools. Many years ago he was teaching English in Luton to Pakistani boys for whom English was a foreign language. Unfortunately these boys faced much physical and verbal abuse from the English boys. One evening George was leaving school at the end of the day having finished preparing lessons for the following day when he saw one of the Pakistani boys lurking in the corridor. The boy told George that he was afraid to leave school as there were four boys outside waiting to beat him up. George said to him, "I shall walk straight towards those boys and you make a run for it". The following day George saw the headmaster and told him about the incident. The Head told him that he would get another teacher to cover for his next lesson while he went round each class in the school to try and identify the four bullies. Luckily he was able to recognize each one and so the Head arranged a meeting with the four bullies and their parents.

At the meeting George was expecting the Head to give them a talking to about their unacceptable behaviour, but he said to them, "Mr. Manuell has something to say to you". George was shocked for the moment but thought quickly and said to the boys, "I am very proud to be British. Are you proud to be British?" They sheepishly agreed. He then said, "My Dad, who was a man of peace, went to war against the Nazis, along with thousands of others so that people in Britain whatever their colour, religion, race or gender could walk down the street without fear of being harassed, bullied or abused and now your behaviour is betraying their sacrifice. I want you to think and give serious thought to what I have just said. Think about your actions to these Pakistani boys in the light of what I have just said.

My brother said that they and their parents looked remorseful but he prayed and often wondered if they took what he said to heart.

Just a thought...

Luke's last chapter – Ascension – Hebrew Scripture

To recap: our exploration of Luke's angle on Jesus started with:

Christmas (angels appearing to poor shepherds, birth in a manger, priestly family of forerunner John the Baptist, the theory developed during the first century of conception by the Holy Spirit); then continued to:

Good Friday (being lenient with sleeping disciples, forgiveness of the repentant thief, serene last words); and brought us to:

Easter (apparently inconsistent accounts; the only gospel to feature the tantalising Emmaus journey; best to focus not on 'what sort of body?' so much as on the many followers who had a personal experience of the risen Christ appearing to them).

It is a fascinating story, immensely rich in detail and thoroughly thought-provoking. Now Luke adds at the very end of the Gospel his brief account of the risen Christ being 'taken up' – 'The Ascension'. It inevitably in our minds brings us back to the 'what sort of body?' conundrum, which we can summarise as having three variations:

- 1. A solid body just as it had been at the Last Supper (in which case, how could it dematerialise into the clouds as in Acts 1, or vanish as at Emmaus? And why did Jesus not continue his ministry when injuries healed?)
- 2. A different sort of 'body' that was not actually flesh-and-bone, but unique to the risen Christ.
- 3. An explanation that had grown up during the first century, which Luke includes because he needed to see Jesus away from the earth's surface (the appearances had ceased) and deeply desired to show Jesus 'exalted' alongside his Father-Creator. This account could be less fact and more the profound spiritual speculation of people who understood the direction in which the faith was to go, i.e. passing the whole Jesus task over to us, his followers.

In his last chapter 24, Luke repeatedly features references to scripture, even precisely mentioning the Law (Pentateuch), the Psalms (Writings) and the Prophets i.e. the whole Hebrew Bible. Why? Because he wants to convey to his readers not just the story of the carpenter's son, but the high status of Jesus, as he is mentioned in scripture: it clinches his standing as Messiah.

Our version of respect for the Bible was not quite the same in Jesus' time – its details were more open to argument and interpretation. Isaiah 53 is for us the

easiest example – 'he was despised, rejected ... by his stripes we are healed etc' – words that can be applied to the final dreadful hours of Jesus' life. They argued this even though they knew that the passage referred to a previous situation of Israel and that the tense was past not future. What more could they want to prove the specialness of Jesus? Yes, he was the Messiah, the Christ.

That brings to a close our exploration of Luke's main waymarks in his Life of Jesus. The story is not over, because Luke uniquely continues his account of the early church in Acts, beginning with a new disciple, Matthias, to fill the gap left by Judas, and the excitement of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost – for which the disciples are charged to remain in Jerusalem.

Finally, when we have covered that, we can explore further unique aspects of Luke's Gospel, like the Good Samaritan, the Lost Son and the differing beatitudes. Luke will continue to amaze for a bit longer...
