Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

Psalm 117: Praise the Lord, all you nations; extol him, all you peoples. For great is his love towards us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever. Praise the Lord.

That's the whole Psalm. It is said to be the central chapter of the King James Bible – excluding the Apocrypha. How do *you* read it? To me, it's a praise-sandwich and the filling is God's love and faithfulness. So not only do we have every reason to praise God, we *ought to* respond with gladness and joy. I give you three little words: *absorb*; *process*; *use*.

What if?

What if we ate, but our bodies didn't absorb the food. We would be wasting our time, and literally wasting away.

What if we ate and absorbed the food, but then it just sat there and none of the nutrition reached the parts it needed to?

Let's assume those two things happen as we would expect, but then, the process stops. It would all have been useless because, unless our bodies use the nutrition, it does us no good whatsoever.

What if our minds absorb all we encounter through our senses and store it, and that is all? We would end up being a shell, totally disconnected from our environment. Isn't it the same with our souls? We have so many messages of love from God: to guide us; lead us; warn us; teach and inspire us. We need to absorb those messages, process them, and use them in our daily living, otherwise our spirits will fade away.

What do you absorb in church? I know what it takes to prepare services: time, commitment, study, thought, self. It's a huge investment.

What if, you made a mental, or physical note of *one* special thing you heard or encountered in a service and thanked the worship leader for that specific insight or message? It would show how you value their effort to connect you closer to God. Don't just leave it at that though: What good is nutrition if it just sits there? Think about that insight or message, process it more deeply and use it. You'll be amazed at how your soul will be nourished.

Vacancy update & an invitation to all

Over the past couple of months, the vacancy group has been discussing what we see as the most important issues in thinking about the future. We have been greatly helped by all that David did in turning our thinking outwards, and we have been trying to look at not just where Emmanuel stands at the moment, but also where God's plans may be taking us in the future.

One line of discussion has been to consider what our new ventures (such as the 5th Friday services in conjunction with Memory Box) tell us about being church. We've also been thinking about how we witness to faith in other spaces, such as the groups Julie & Han are running.

Another line of thinking has been to look at the synod mission criteria. There are 9 of these criteria, all shaped as statements that start: "This church is...". For example, "This church is committed to caring for people of all ages both inside and outside its community". On a scale of 0-10, how would you score Emmanuel on this?

But if the question were written in the future tense, "This church wants to be....", would that change your answer? Or would it tell you about a skills gap or people shortage that we need to think about? And then if you had to start choosing between the 9 statements, which would be your priorities?

While the vacancy group has had a good go at getting to some answers on this, we want to widen out the conversation to as many as possible at Emmanuel. So here's the invitation – an open meeting where you're invited to come and join with others in discussing these 9 statements.

Whether you've already got strong opinions on this, or simply want to come and listen to others, you're most welcome. Ian M will be leading the session, and we'll be taking the outputs from this into our discussions with wider councils of the church.

Just a thought...

PENTECOST... Our church calendar has moved on: Christmas/Epiphany, Good Friday, Easter and Ascension are now behind us. The events in the life of Jesus in Luke's gospel are over and we think forwards into the beginnings of the Church that is described in Acts. We are fortunate that Luke provides this continuation of the activity of the exalted Christ. Matthew, Mark and John have no more to say, but Luke's story, triumphant despite suffering, continues.

I nearly wrote 'the beginnings of the Church *that Jesus founded'*. That would imply that Jesus wanted to found a *different* religious set-up from the Judaism of which he was part. Not really. What we read in the gospels is Jesus' putting God's will into practice – he was forever a Jew – and that is part of the reason why we Christians hold on to *his* Scriptures, what we call the Old Testament. He simply wanted everyone, whatever their national identity, to live a life that honours God.

His early followers did not want a new religious community either. However, they *did* want to see him recognised as the Messiah – the 'Christ' in Greek. It was this specific point of difference that led to Christianity becoming, not the New Judaism, but a different faith in its own right – because the early Christians failed to get their point across to the people of Israel.

So, seeing what came about historically, we *can* call Pentecost the Birthday of the Church – this new way of looking at life called Christianity. The event is characterised by an amazing sense of energy and power in the minds, the total personalities, of the followers of Jesus. All the wind, flames and fire symbolised the can-do spirit that filled them seven weeks after the Crucifixion, and the Resurrection appearances.

It is all this energy that impressed Luke, and, doubtless, was his personal experience. It is as if Luke allowed seven weeks' bereavement time while they mourned that cruel death, realised that they had to cope without him and took in the fact that they were not going to benefit from his appearing to them any longer. *Now* was time for the Jesus energy to be released *in them*.

So, looking back, we can see that Luke's view of Jesus in his Gospel is infused with this sense not just of survival, but of triumphant moving forward in the faith. Luke's experience relating to Acts 2 determined the way he thought about the life of Jesus as recounted in his Gospel. Jesus was wonderful during his time in

Galilee and Jerusalem, and now just as strong, just as available, just as encouraging as he had been then.

No wonder that Luke emphasises Jesus' Good News for the poor and his valuing of humanity as a whole (not just Jews). No wonder, too, that he can't believe that Jesus said to his Father on the cross, 'Why have you abandoned me?' – it is clear to Luke that he must have confidently said, 'Into your hands I commit my spirit'. The Spirit that was now energising his followers seven weeks later at Pentecost was what enabled Jesus to cope with the Cross and energise people by appearing to them a couple of days later.

So much for the great story of Pentecost, so far as the Christian community is concerned. There is also a broader perspective, a Grand Plan, on which we can reflect.

Genesis 11 says that the whole world spoke the same language. Whether that was literally true or not is beside the point: the theological principle is that sinful humanity was disastrously self-centred and over-reached itself: that is the symbolism of the Tower of Babel story. This is expressed in Genesis by the ending of the single (God's) language and the spilling out of multiple languages i.e. the lack of a unified understanding according to God's original intention for humanity, the destruction of worldwide unity under God.

Now at Pentecost... what happened? The position was reversed. Everyone understood each other! A unified understanding was re-established – under Christ. It was not the original ideal imagined by one of the authors of Genesis, but, in a way, it is better: people of differing nations and languages are united because they are one in Christ.

Moreover, Luke has elevated the carpenter's son to *the* position of exalted power, that will soon enable the Church born at Pentecost to establish Christ as One with the Spirit and the Father in what was called the Holy Trinity. More of that later...

BETRAYAL AND THE REPLY

In 1988 my wife Rita and I met up in Seattle on the West Coast of the U.S.A. with George and Betty two of the American teachers that I had been teaching with in East Africa in the early 1960's. From Seattle we did a 5 week camping trip across America all the way to Boston on the East Coast.

One evening by the camp fire George told us a story about their son Paul who had won a scholarship to Harvard. In his last long vacation he got a job with a Travel Book Publisher to update their book Lets's Go', a travel advice book to backpackers who were travelling cheaply in Turkey.

Soon after arriving in Turkey, Paul met up with a Turkish student who was eager to improve his English. They got on well and the young man was able to help Paul with travel advice for updating his book and teaching him some basic Turkish. By way of "Thank-You" Paul being financially better off was able to help him with the cost of accommodation and food. However after travelling around for nearly a month together Paul was shocked to wake up one morning and find that his companion was gone and that he had stolen his money.

Fortunately being an experienced traveller Paul had secreted some money away in his rucksack for emergencies. Also in his rucksack he had the Turkish student's home address – he had spoken of village life and his parents and family with affection. Having a few days to go before his flight back to the U.S.A. Paul decided to make the difficult journey by train and bus to the parents village.

On arrival at their modest house he knocked nervously and when they came to the door he explained that he was a friend of their son. They made him feel welcome and introduced him to their family and friends as a friend of their son. Even with his small knowledge of Turkish and their small knowledge of English they got on well. After staying two days he left, having made no mention of their son's betrayal of friendship and trust. Paul wondered what the young man thought when he heard of the visit and the fact that he had not said a word about his bad behaviour.
