

Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

Since becoming a member of Emmanuel I have read the Pastoral Letter with great interest. I'm amazed at the knowledge of the bible by the writers and had often wondered what they would make of my idea of Christianity. Most of the Bible means nothing to me. I often think of the stories as perfect for the time in which they were written. A time when things had to be explained to be understood. Today, when so much more knowledge is known, some of it makes no sense. Also being a descendant of slaves, I can't accept that a loving God would tell a slave to honour their master. If we are all God's children, made in His image, then surely we are all the same.

I live by the words attributed to Jesus. "A new commandant I give you...that you love one another as I love you." What a wonderful world it would be. I try very hard to treat everyone as I like to be treated. It doesn't always work, because not everyone does the same. It breaks my heart to see the decline in Church attendance as the years go by, but having experienced the worst racism in Churches, I can understand the decline. When a minister after preaching, can ask you not to come back to his church because you're upsetting the congregation....you have to stop and wonder if he believes what he just preached. Younger people have so many such stories even today, that they can't be blamed for the decline of Christianity. They are so much more inclusive of others in their world. We could learn so much if we listened more to them.

I love the fellowship offered by the members of Emmanuel since joining you. The programme of activities offered weekly speaks volumes of your Christianity. To me we are truly treating others as we would like to be treated.

A few updates which were reported at Church Meeting in July:

The Gift Aid claim for the tax year 2024-25 has been submitted, with thanks to Sam Pickering for his detailed work. Just over £12,000 will come to the general fund which shows how important Gift Aid is to our income. We received a legacy from the estate of Carol Matthews.

Soap Box

When asked to make a contribution to Emmanuel Life there were some things which I had thought of expressing for some time but more along the lines of the "Soap Box" comments which the late Jim Drury had instigated some years ago. Perhaps the following should be read on this basis rather than in the pastoral sense.

During Lockdown I was browsing through our book shelves and came across a book which did leave an impression on me. It was entitled "The End of Faith" and written by Sam Harris; unsurprisingly, it was praised by Richard Dawkins. Essentially it was a polemic on the assertion that it is religion which is the root cause of most of the conflict in the world. It commenced starkly by focussing on what can possibly drive a young man to board a bus carrying explosives on his back with the sole purpose of blowing himself and his fellow passengers up. According to the author, only religious fanaticism could do this and consequently, in an age of increasingly dangerous weaponry, religious faith should be more robustly challenged. The book was highly thought provoking and I think that we all have to accept that organised religion can inspire cultural norms of behaviour which, if they become too embedded, can lead to prejudice. Even within Christianity, traditions and doctrinal issues can range from the minor but interesting to what have been in the past seriously divisive.

Until a few years ago I was a keen enthusiast for the annual Churches' Walk from which I learned a lot but it was noticeable that some of the liveliest and most welcoming churches were those supported by an ex patriot community so perhaps there can be a blending of organised religion and a sense of nationhood. Dictators are not above exploiting such expressions of identity if the feel it supports their tyranny. However I recall that the book's main flaw was that not enough attention was paid to the secular extremism arising from nationalistic fascism or extreme forms of socialism with proponents of such movements fostering a quasi religious intensity.

Having read the book it left me with the feeling that extreme attachment to any form of organised religion can lead to conflict. That being said, I have no wish to be sneering about religious tradition in general. I am thankful to have had a fairly conventional Church of Scotland upbringing which I hope imbued me with some moral compass to help me cope in this age of frantic individualism. Perhaps these thoughts are all a bit random but the idea which I am trying to get across is one which I think we all share in that sincerely held personal faith

is likely to be a force for peace and good in the world but blind attachment to religious or political extremism could end up having the opposite effect. Nothing I read made me feel that we should diminish our non zealous U. R. C. type efforts at outreach within our community.

To round off this little piece, I am drawing on two recent services at Emmanuel which featured quotes from Galatians chapter 3, verse 26 which perfectly expresses our ideals in so far that people are "all one in union with Christ".

I am going to conclude this little piece in a totally different vein. I did mention to the younger generation of my family that I was going to make a contribution to Emmanuel Life and was told "couldn't you say something about "Happy Young People of Emmanuel Rejoice" for which there had been happy memories so I have added this by way of encouragement to those hard working people who are endeavouring to create a youthful community within the church family.

Just a thought...

St Luke - The Amazing Chapter 10



The 'portrait' of Luke is by Vladimir Borovikovsky (1757-1825) and shows the winged bull, or ox, the symbol of the evangelist.

This is the first full chapter of Luke's special section. The journey to Jerusalem has begun, with all its implications of opposition, suffering, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension. All that hangs over us as we read chapters 10 to 19.

First, he gives us a foretaste of what will happen the Acts of the Apostles, when the gospel message is going to spread out with power. Here in the Gospel Luke now relates how Jesus sends out 70 (or 72).

Imagine you are Luke, with pen poised working out how to organise this symbolic journey towards Jerusalem. You know what will happen at Pentecost in Acts 2, even though you haven't written it yet. You want to be positive, so you make your starting point a successful project in which six times the number of core disciples (6x12=72) go out into the region, apprehensive, scared even, and come back successful.— even demons have been subdued! Jesus gives a spiritual whoop of delight: 'I saw Satan fall, like lightning, from heaven'. Luke adds: 'Jesus exulted in the Holy Spirit', for it is a glimpse of Pentecost in advance.

Second, Luke lifts a story which Mark tells in the last fateful week of Jesus' life: a scribe challenges Jesus to sum up the Law and Jesus gives the reply. In our special chapter 10, Luke *creatively repositions it in the most telling way:* instead of this exchange happening in the last few days of Jesus' life, Luke brings it forward to the start of this journey to Jerusalem, the lawyer asking Jesus, 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?' Unlike in Mark (where Jesus replies himself) *Luke switches the dialogue around, so that Jesus gets the lawyer to give the answer:* he quotes from Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18. Luke must have asked himself, 'How would Jesus have tackled this situation?' Getting the lawyer to respond engages him in dialogue in the way that rabbis or lawyers were trained and, above all, places Jesus in his rightful senior position. And what insight, how creative is that on the part of Luke?

Sometimes the lawyer's follow-up question, 'But who is my neighbour?' is seen as niggly and disrespectful, but surely this is not so: it is a highly trained expert

speaking to a greater(!) expert, furthering the argument in the normal way.

The crucial next stage is that Luke has the insight to know that *Jesus would not have continued to argue, but would tell a story instead,* a far more effective way forward and a master-stroke in getting the heart of the Gospel across.

Surely the best-known story in the Christianised world is stunning in its power: pretty well everyone knows what being 'a Good Samaritan' means. Consider some of its challenging aspects that stretch the meaning of 'neighbour':

- professionals of the religious establishment fail to respond to the situation
- the man who does respond comes from a rival, hostile, background
- he uses wine and oil for first aid items he may have intended to sell.
- he is amazingly generous, offering the innkeeper limitless recompense.



At the end, the lawyer's answer to Jesus' question is: 'The one who showed him kindness'. The theological question about eternal life that the two expert biblical scholars discussed has now been answered with simplicity: *be kind*. This is one of the high points of the gospels, the story that lies behind so many good works, such as the founding of countless hospitals.

But Luke's master stroke is yet to come: he asks himself, 'How does a person become a Good Samaritan?' His answer is to insert the story of Martha and Mary at this point, even though geographically (Bethany is in the south) the two

sisters of John 11 may not easily fit his journey narrative.

Martha is like the Good Samaritan: selflessly serving, because *that*, for her, is loving God and neighbour: love *in action*. Many Christians identify with her: Martha gets on with the job, she walks the talk. If she gets a bit stressed and thinks her sister is not helpful, we sympathise. She is the conscientious one who takes responsibility. We understand her perfectly because, when we want to get something right, we can get stressed too.

The key is in the ending: 'Mary has chosen the best *part/portion/idea/way*. You can't take that away from her.' The word can mean 'part' of anything – it could be a 'portion' of a pie or stew or cake, or even a 'course'. Martha is serving a meal. We are in the Mediterranean: imagine a meal of several 'mezze', on small plates. When Martha and Mary are at home, they usually have just one each, cold or hot. For her special guest, would she make one more small plateful? Of course not – she would make at least six more!



It is now midday and Martha says humorously to Jesus: 'If you want your food before three o'clock, get that idle sister of mine to come and help me!' Mary stays where she is, feeling a bit guilty but not moving. Jesus says, 'Martha, how many mezze are you making? Looks like you're doing extra for me. You're so kind. No wonder you've got such a big job on. You don't have to, you know!' With ironic humour about himself, Jesus goes on: 'Martha, you don't need to provide *many* mezze. Only *one* is needed – and Mary has chosen it – it's *me*! You can't take me away from her, can you?'

Martha bursts out laughing: 'Oh, get away with you!' Mary looks up with relief: Jesus has burst the bubble of Martha's stress. Mary says to Martha while giving Jesus a sideways look, 'I'll do the washing up, then!' Jesus winks at Mary and grins at Martha. There is no criticism of Martha, only sympathy for a good cook who wants to get it all right. Mary is not a lazy and unhelpful sister: she knows she could have helped with the multi-mezze meal without being told. She is just a loving person who makes the most of Jesus' presence, having the insight to know that he may not be with them for ever.

Luke is well aware of this last point, because a few verses back he introduces his special section with: 'As the time approached when he was to be taken up to heaven, he set his face resolutely towards Jerusalem': we readers already know that he will not be around for long. We must make the most of his being here: exactly what Mary does. Being with Jesus is a refresher course for being a thoughtful and kind human being, being a... Good Samaritan.

So Luke has placed the Martha and Mary story at this point in chapter 10 to convey the central message that the best training is simply *to be with Jesus*. The story complements the Good Samaritan parable: love in action (Martha and the Samaritan) requires us to *be with Jesus*, just like Mary.

Next month we will be celebrating Harvest Festival and giving to Commitment for Life. It is good to know that our money directly helps people such as Blessing. Here is her story.

When the family farm began struggling, Blessings' husband moved to the city to find work.

"Things were hard," remembers Blessings. "We were living hand-to- mouth and had to wait for provisions to be sent from my husband. I found life really tough – doing everything on my own, trying to get something out of the land in drought. When I managed to harvest something, I couldn't get decent prices."

Blessings tells how things changed for herself and the wider community with the coming of BRACT, a *Commitment for Life* sponsored project in Zimbabwe. "The project taught us about disaster risk management, and this helped us plan what we need to do in case of droughts and even price fluctuations. The 'climate smart' agriculture training made us realise we can use less fertilisers, farm without cattle to help us plough and still get a harvest even when the rainfall is low. We can also grow feed for our livestock in our fields and make

hay for the cattle and goats. This was all completely new to us."

Thank you for your wonderful support for BRACT through *Commitment for Life*. People all across Zimbabwe, like Blessings and her family, have had their lives transformed.

SILENCE IS GOLDEN

In the days of the Empire, the British Government used to recruit people to serve in overseas territories. When I taught at a school in Brunei, Borneo two of the older teachers had formerly been employed by the British Colonial Service. One of them, John South, told me that he had been recruited to serve in the Malaysian Education Service soon after the Second World War finished. After a training course in England, he was sent to be a teacher in Alor Setar, on the west coast of Peninsular Malaya. One of his colleagues on the same course was sent to be a District Officer, several days journey up river in Sarawak, Borneo. A river journey by boat was the only way to get to this outpost. This colleague was "thrown in at the deep end" and having learnt some Malay in England, he then had to learn the local tribal language and his District Officer Duties on the job. The tradition at that time was that the local Pengulu (Headman) would find a young woman at a certain age to do the new officer's laundry, cooking, housework and also see to his "other needs". If children resulted and the officer was posted else where a payment would be made to the family left behind.

About 18 years later, John South, who had since become Headmaster of the school at Alor Setar, was posted as an Education Inspector to Kuching, the main town in Sarawak, Borneo. Imagine his surprise when he met up with his former colleague, who had just returned from long leave in England with a young English wife and a new job in Kuching in Education Administration. John South who had been married for some years, invited them round for an evening meal. During the meal, John looked long and hard at the Eurasian serving girl that his wife had recently taken on. He remembered the up river location that she came from and her age and looking at her features as she served his guest, he knew that she was serving her father and his new English wife.




